## Who Will Try?

The Ontario Department of Agriculture has received a share of the grant made by the Dominion Parliament for the advancement of agriculture and has decided to devote part of it to the extension of Field Crop Competition in connection with Agricultural Societies. Each Society has the privilege of choosing three crops. The Government gives \$50.00 to each crop and the Society \$25.00. This is divided into seven prizes, which should be an inducement to farmers to enter into the competition. South Grey Society has taken two, five acres on the usual conditions and one acre of mangels. Each field must be of one variety, but each competitor can enter any variety of either oats or mangels and can show in both. We expect many South Grey farmers will "make a try" of these handsome prizes.
