Gun-running in Ulster.

Surely never was a more glaring act of rebellion without due cause perpetrated than that of Friday and Saturday last in Ulster when 35,000 rifles and 200,000 rounds of ammunition were unloaded on the coast of Ulster, under the very nose of the coast guards.

Why was the alarm not given? Telegraph and telephone wires were made useless, individual officials were surrounded, and the whole scheme carried out with a cunning worthy of a better cause. Hundreds of automobiles were ready to switch the rifles off for distribution, and the instigators of this crime move about in parliament and glory in the trouble they cause the government.

One story says that the rifles were bought in Germany, paid for by rich Lords and Landlords, placed on a ship with a new name painted on and other ruses to deceive. One may admire their ingenuity while condemning and deploring an action that is most likely to lead to civil war.

The civil authorities and police being powerless, there must be recourse to the army to compel respect to law and order. If the army fail or refuse then Britain is in a state of anarchy. Then, say the Nationalists, it is time we were organized and thus, over at least three fourths of Ireland, organization is taking place, and a fighting force formed in opposition to the madman Carson and his volunteers that may lead to the spilling of blood and to an end of the era of good feeling that has been growing up, for many years to come.

Such fanaticism as this gun-running business shows, could scarcely be exceeded and no wonder Premier Asquith terms it "a grave and unprecedented outrage. He added: "The Government will take without delay, appropriate steps to vindicate the authority of the law and protect the officers and servants of the King in the exercise of their duties and in the enjoyment of their rights."

A sort of military government has been formed in Down and Antrim, with Major General Maoready sworn in as President magistrate.

This Week in the Legislature

Redistribution

Vigorous protests were made by Mr Rowell and the Liberal members against what they call the jerry-mander of the proposed redistribution. The most intolerable unfairness, they claim, comes in the changes in the County of Bruce, which now returns three Liberal members. Under the proposed redistribution most of the Liberals will be lived in one seat to be known as West Bruce with a Liberal majority, on the basis of the vote at the last election of 1907. In both the other Bruce seats, under the new scheme, there are Conservative majorities, one of 7, the other of over 300.

This means that one of the Liberal members, William McDonald of Centre Bruce, is practically to be eliminated, and J. G. Anderson, Liberal member for South Bruce, instead of having a Liberal majority to start with, will have a Conservative majority of 7 to fight against.

Other changes, obviously for political reasons, are also projected in the Greys where North and South Grey will be strengthened for the Conservatives by transferring to them Conservative townships from Centre Grey a safe Conservative constituency. By re-arrangement of the Victorias also the Government evidently hopes to save a seat which they were in danger of losing. Instead of four ridings in the Niagara Peninsula there will be five with Mouck, Liberal constituency, abolishing Of these five two show Liberal majorities. In Essex there will be three seats instead of two, one of these a Liberal riding.

Strong objection is being taken to the re-division in Toronto of the A and B arrangement of seats. No Temperance Advance

Even the Conservatives themselves were surprised at the slight changes in the Liquor License Act brought down by Hon. W. J. Hanna. The Mail and Empire and several Government papers had predicted the closing of the bars on Saturday afternoon and on all holidays, but the actual change is simply to add Good Friday to Christmas as days on which the bars are to be closed, leaving them open on Saturday afternoon and on other holidays. The other changes are ones of minor importance. No real temperance advance is made and this, too, in spite of the proximity of a General Election.

NOTES

Hon. Adam Beck introduced his Bill for Hydro Radials which was cordially supported by Mr Rowell and the Opposition.

William McDonald, Liberal member for Centre Bruce, referred to the "society snobs" who would disport themselves at social functions in the new Government House, being built on a scale of lavish extravagance by the present Government, and which will have to be paid for by the people of the Province.

The Anti-treating law promised by the leader of the government, has been given a long hoist. Hon. Mr Hanna stated that out of respect to Sir James Whitney's feelings no such legislation will be entertained this session and no announcement as to what course will be adopted.

King George and Queen Mary were most royally received in Paris. Some say the welcome exceeded all previous similar functions.
