Shall Grey Try the Canada Temperance Act?

Continued from page 1 would be discussed in a non-partisan atmosphere. At present in the Ontario Legislature a true temperance measure would pass by an enormous majority if members were freed from the shackles of the party caucus. It reviewed at length the advantages and disadvantages of the Local Option Act and Canada Temperance Act and said the 3-5ths handicap was likely to remain as long as the present government was in power. Every move made by temperance men to have the weak points of Canada Temperance Act (C. T. A.) strengthened was met by the plea that the liquor men will demand the insertion of the 8-5ths clause in it too. Such is baneful power of the liquor traffic. Local Option was a magnificent friend of temperance in this province, but it would be better if it had the majority rule feature of the C. T. A.

A NERVOUS TRICK.—A sealed letter addressed to the Herald-Times, Walkerton, and containing a cash remittance of three dollars from a subscriber, was opened by a village postmaster in Bruce County, who extracted 25 cents from the amount as commission for himself and forwarded the balance of \$2.75. The "postmaster" placed the words "news agency" under his signature to make the grafting game he was pulling off look more plausible. The subscriber however, was only credited with \$2.75 at this end, and on coming to Walkerton was surprised to find that his letter had been interfered with in transit. As the unauthorized opening of sealed mail by postmasters is a criminal offence punishable with a heavy penalty, the postmaster is expected to get by a trick of this kind is hardly commensurate with the chances he takes in getting in wrong and landing under the shadow of a stone wall.—Walkerton Herald.

Regulations Governing Parcels Post.

Articles acceptable at Parcel Post rates include Merchandise of all descriptions—Books—Roots—Seeds—Farm Produce, etc., but not letters, Explosives or Intoxicating Liquors. Parcels must be tied up firmly, but not sealed, the postage prepaid and name and address of sender placed inside or on the cover. Parcels containing Letters, will be forwarded at Letter Rate and short paid parcels will be forwarded and double the deficient postage collected at destination. Limit of weight for February, March and April—6 pounds. Limit of size—2 1/2 feet by 1 foot by 1 foot or 2 1/2 feet long—(rolls)—6 feet girth by 2 1/2 feet high—6 feet over all. Parcels will not be Registered, but may be insured—5c in addition to the postage, raising for insurance on actual value of contents up to \$25.00 and 10c up to \$50.00. Parcels of fragile or perishable matter, such as Eggs, Meat, Fish, Glass, Liquid, etc., cannot be insured. Tags and Labels for Perishable and Fragile parcels will be furnished by the Postmaster. Parcels bearing a Return Request and after 15 days, parcels bearing the name and address of sender will be returned direct to sender, who will be required to pay a charge equal to the original postage. After delivery has been made a parcel will not be returned to the sender unless the person returning it pays the return postage. Parcels may contain Invoices or Accounts provided they relate exclusively to the contents of parcel, also cards or labels with brief necessary directions for the identification of each article, when several are enclosed in the one parcel. Parcels containing Liquids, Oils, etc., must be enclosed in Wooden, Metal or Papier Mache blocks or tubes with sufficient cotton or other packing to take up contents in case of breakage. Damaged Parcels, which have been insured, will be held for enquiry and when loss of part of contents occurs the cover of parcel must be produced. For quicker and safer despatch mail parcels as early in the day as possible. When in doubt call at the Post Office and get full information.
