Mackenzie & Mann and Millions

Mackenzie and Mann are the controlling owners of the Canadian Northern Railway. The lines built by the Canadian Northern and its subsidiary railway companies have been constructed by Mackenzie, Mann and Company, contractors. The same Mackenzie and Mann who control the Canadian Northern are the Mackenzie and Mann of the company who built the roads constructed by the railway company. And Mackenzie and Mann, railway owners, awarded contracts to Mackenzie and Mann, contractors, without tenders. It was a very nice arrangement for Mackenzie and Mann.

For building the Halifax and South-western—a Mackenzie and Mann railway—Mackenzie and Mann, contractors, received \$5,663,972; for building the Canadian Northern, Quebec, \$4,228,889; for work done on the Canadian Northern Ontario lines, \$52,815,625; for Canadian Northern lines from Fort Arthur to the Yellow Head Pass, \$109,095,627; for Canadian Northern Pacific lines, \$34,760,909, with more to come; for smaller contracts, \$5,299,681. Not content with giving Mackenzie and Mann these fine contracts—paid for out of assistance given by the people of Canada—and given them without tender, Mackenzie and Mann, railway owners, gave Mackenzie and Mann, contractors, the work of purchasing equipment for the railway. As a result of this move another score or so of millions was set down to the credit of Mackenzie and Mann.

—Hon. Dr. Reid, acting Minister of Railways, admitted in the House that a dozen U. States companies had been asked to tender for the contract of supplying the government railways with coal for the fiscal year 1914-15. An admission that "truck and trade with the Yankees" is beneficial. It seems funny when some Canadian coal mines are closed down for lack of business.

—Messrs W. F. Nickle, Kingston, and R. B. Bennet, Calgary, two well-known Conservatives, have refused to be a party to the \$45,000,000 deal which the Borden government are about concluding with Mackenzie and Mann. Their reason is "because in our opinion the Government proposals are in the interest of railway contractors and not of the people." Over \$200,000,000 in cash and credit have already gone to these men and the Liberals will demand a clearer accounting before granting more, helped in this by Messrs Bennet and Nickle.

—A violent earthquake causing an equally violent eruption of Mt. Etna, in Sicily, has brought death to about 200 villagers, who in spite of past records will persist in building on the sides of the treacherous volcano. Much destruction of property of course

and perhaps more lives lost yet as the full truth becomes known. The first recorded eruption of Etna occurred 467 years before Christ and near a score of big eruptions since.

The buyer for the Hydro-Electric was up last week and purchased a number of the farms affected by the Eugenia development. He will return in a week or two and complete the work.—Flesherton Advance.

Competition in Hog Raising

There are men who say that there is no money in raising hogs and there are others who say that they would not be without a few hogs about the farm as they like to hear the little buggers squeal. The Provincial Department of Agriculture have given out the undermentioned rules to govern a pig feeding competition and there are many young men around the town of Durham that should enter the competition. Possibly there are some members of the Farmers' Clubs and Granges that would like to enter. If so they should send in their entries at once to K. O. Duff, District Representative, Markdale, or to Thos. H. Binnie, Secy. Grey County Board of Agriculture, Ericsville, R. R. No. 2, and they will see that the entries are forwarded to the proper authorities. The rules are:

1. This competition shall be confined to farmers' sons under 25 years of age or to those who have taken a course in Agriculture under the District Representative.
2. There must be five entries before the competition can be concluded. Entries close June 1st, 1914.
3. Hogs are to be weaned at six weeks and fed till seven months old, when they will be carefully inspected and weighed by the District Representative. All reports must be in by Dec. 10, 1914.
4. Each contestant must feed three hogs. A fourth may be fed and used as a spare in case of accident or disease.
5. The hogs must be fed and cared for by the contestant and an accurate account kept of the kind and amount of food consumed.
6. At the time of entry the District Representative will inspect the hogs and mark with ear tags or in some equally suitable way. He will also give contestant directions re keeping account of food consumed and cost of same.
7. A uniform price will be allowed for the various kinds of feed used by the contestants—refuse from house not to be fed.
8. Later a suitable form will be supplied to each contestant for making statement of costs, etc. The contestant will be required to sign a statement as to the truthfulness of his figures.
9. The prize will be free transportation and living expenses to the Two Weeks' Short Course in Live Stock and Seed Judging at the Ontario Agricultural College, January 1915. The winner will be selected on the following basis:
 - (a) 50 points for highest net profit.
 - (b) 50 points for type and finish, this judging to be done with the bacon hog score card.
 - (c) Where there are more than 12 entries, two men will be sent to Guelph.
