FAILING PROSPERITY.—In the month of April, 1913, the total revenue of the Dominion amounted to \$12,145,455. In April, 1914, the total revenue stood at \$9,848,998. In other words there was a decrease of \$2,296,457 or more than eighteen per cent. The greater part of the decrease came in the falling off in custom's revenue, as indication of a continued drop in Canadian trade. For months past there has been a great and steady decline of Canadian trade and the April figures indicate that this accompanying of Borden rule continues markedly evident.
