There seems to be no outlet to this pond and is a magnificent breeding place for mosquitos, flies and insects of all descriptions. We have had enough contagious disease in the village this year and it would be a wise deed to drain this surplus liquid off. A small expenditure would eradicate both of the evils mentioned here and if it is to be done, the sooner those in authority are alive to the fact the better.
