#### Home Rule at Last

Monday, 25th May, 1914, will be a memorable one in British history, for on this date was passed by the House of Commons for the third time, the measure giving local self government to Ireland.

For 114 years a parliamentary union has existed that has not by any means brought about a unity of feeling. The sentiment of nationality that exists in Ireland, and rightly exists, has never been satisfied and now in spite of the stormy opposition that has been displayed of late, one would vainly hope that an era of peace and good feeling would prevail in the Green Isle.

For over 700 years the shadow of English overlordship has never been absent. Frequently there was oppression, always there was suspicion, now both should lie in one grave.

Ireland will have 42 members still at Westminster, and the new measure provides for an Irish House of Commons of 164 with a Senate numbering 40, and every provision made to satisfy the fears of those who think that Home Rule means Rome Rule.

John Redmond will have an undying place in Irish history. His advice to his followers to refrain from offensive demonstrations in the hour of victory seems to be well followed. The self control shown by the Nationalists under much provocation gives hope for the future. Britain and the Empire will greatly gain with a contented and happy Ireland lying by her side. Still greater will be the gain when Home Rule is given to England, Wales and Scotland also.

The spectacle of the House of Lords standing impotently by, with no further say in the matter, shows how far Britain has travelled towards or on the highway of Democracy.

#### Will be Conscience for No Man.

So says last week's Christian Guardian in an article on "Temperance and the Ontario Elections." After pointing out that the Conservative Party stand for law enforcement and the further use of local option, but no radical temperance legislation, it contrasts this with the Reform attitude, the immediate abolition of all bar and club licenses, and a majority vote—not 3-fifths—to apply to the extinction of shop licenses. It proceeds:

Now this is not all temperance people have been asking for, and it is not all that the Provincial Legislature could do in the matter; but it does include two very important demands. Ontario temperance men have been making for a decade or more. Under such circumstances the man who puts temperance before party seems to us to have a pretty clear course marked out as to how his vote should be cast.

Mr Rowell's policy with reference to the liquor question should appeal strongly to every temperance man, not because it is Mr Rowell's policy, but because, so far as it goes, it represents the temperance policy of Ontario for years past. To reprobate this policy now would seem to come dangerously near to declaring previous declarations insincere. We would not try to be a conscience for any man, but as the matter looks to us, in a straight contest between a Conservative who stands by his party policy on the same issue, the ardent and honest temperance voter does not seem to have much ground to hesitate.

Let our temperance men get promptly to work. Reformers and Conservatives, and see that as far as possible every party nominee is in favor of the abolition of the bar. If this is done there is no shadow of doubt that in our next legislature we shall have a large majority of the members pledged to that progressive program of reform. We confidently believe that by a party vote or a non-party vote, and we care not by which, the bar and the club licenses may be legislated out of existence in our province in the very near future. And the call we make to every voter in the province at this crisis in the history of temperance reform is to do his very best, in the fear of God, as opportunity offers, to bring about this consummation devoutly to be wished from a hundred points of view.

#### Kill the Roosters

Eggs which have been fertilized constitute the greatest proportion of the inferior stock which, when examined, proves unfit for food. It is not necessary that these shall have remained for a time under a broody hen at a temperature of seventy degrees being, in itself, sufficient to cause the germ to commence to grow. If the heat is constant the development of the chick will continue, but if it ceases or is intermittent, putrefaction at once sets in and the egg becomes bad. On the other hand infertile eggs which are free from the acuta germ cell, do not, under ordinary conditions, deteriorate seriously.

Few farmers seem to realize these facts and consequently very few make any effort to insure infertility. The impression prevails among many, that the presence of the male bird in the flock is essential to the production of a maximum number of eggs. This assumption has been proven, time and time again, to be absolutely without foundation.

Farmers and others selling eggs for market are recommended to kill off or dispose of the male birds after the breeding season. As a result of their remaining with the flock after June 1st, Canadian farmers lose each year at least a million dollars, through the presence of partially incubated eggs in the produce which is marketed. The fact that the best trade in many cities in Canada offers the premium of from one to five cents per dozen, for non-fertilized eggs, suggests an additional financial consideration which but few can afford to overlook.

#### County Convention
