Elections Are On

Voting on 29th June.

The Government makes a premature appeal to the Electors.

Saturday last the Provincial government slipped the ropes of the secret they have been nursing for some weeks and let the public know officially that an election was on, a year and a half at least before an election was necessary. The haste as everyone is aware is to snatch a verdict from the people as long as Sir James Whitney is at the helm. His recent severe illness has put his health in uncertain quantity and it may well be that he is desirous of retiring from the Premiership. That action on his part would lead to confusion in his cabinet, where harmony does not sit as a brooding dove, and so it has been thought wise from a partisan standpoint to appeal to the people for another term to settle or make up differences when a new leader has to be chosen.

The people of Ontario of course have no direct interest in these differences but partisanship leads often and has led in the past, by such parties, to just such action. For three successive terms the Provincial parliament has lived only three of its four years. In 1911, the opportunity to win when the Federal victory feeling was yet strong, was not let slip. In 1914, the urgency is of a different nature, but equally dictated by partisan motives.

Will the game work? Will the electors again return so pronouncedly Sir James Whitney and his followers? During the life of the parliament just closing as never before, weaknesses have developed and irresolution has been shown that makes the cry "Time for a change" most opportune.

In spite of pressure from their own friends and of course from the Liberal party they refuse to budge on Assessment Reform. Three times they have rejected it, and won't even allow municipalities local option in the matter.

It has been pressed upon them that the 3-fifths clause is not necessary to retain local option, yet they refuse to remove this injustice.

There may or may not be "a nigger in the fence" in the refusal to let full light in on the Prohibition charges and in the movements of Inspector Snider in the Scott & Co campaign, but strong men would at once reveal the inmost secret.
