Predicts Rowell's Victory

The following editorial appeared recently in the Toronto World, a Conservative newspaper:

"Mr Rowell has a right to be proud of the fine demonstration he has evoked in Massey Hall, and he has this reflection to give him confidence that if the Ontario voters respond to his appeal as they did to the Ross plebiscite of fourteen years ago he will be returned to the Legislature at the head of a working majority. The situation is a more critical one for the Government than their supporters generally conceive. The growth of independent electoral opinion has brought about the feeling that governments exist for the advantage of the governed, and that when benefits are required, social reforms urgently needed, and measures adopted in other enlightened communities are ripe for application in Ontario, it does not matter which party gives relief so long as relief is given."

No government is sustained on the strength of what it has done; it can only rely on the strength of what it is going to do. This is which gives the Opposition an equal chance in every election. An Opposition, if it can convince the people, may do as great things as any government. Sir James Whitney has promised to continue his present policies. Mr Rowell promises to abolish the bar and institute tax reform. The positive factor of Mr Rowell's platform, will, with many people, outweigh the premier's honorable and progressive past.—Toronto World.

A Rowell Appreciation

Hamilton Times: We doubt if there is any other statesman in Canada who has come to the front so rapidly as has Mr N. W. Rowell, K. C., the leader of the Ontario Opposition. When Mr Rowell first entered the House Sir James Whitney treated him with supercilious indifference, bordering upon impertinence. He apparently looked upon the new Liberal leader as a lightweight, as a greenhorn not worth bothering with. But not many weeks elapsed before Sir James awakened to the fact that he had no ordinary man to deal with. Then he began to bully him and bludgeon him. But the new and untried man soon proved that he was more than a match for Sir James. His bludgeon blows were met and parried with a rapier-like skill that resulted in the Premier wildly beating the air, while Mr Rowell tickled him under the fifth rib and made him howl and growl. So well informed, so clever in debate, and so resourceful and ready did Mr Rowell prove to be that now he is the most feared man in the House. He has forged to the front. He is the leading figure in the Legislature, and will soon be the leading figure in the province.

Temperance the Supreme Issue

(From the Canadian Baptist)

The supreme issue in the coming elections is that of the Rowell Temperance policy. Other things there are to be sure, that must share the thought of an intelligent electorate and their legislators; but for the time being the Temperance issue eclipses all other issues before this fair and prosperous province. And with things as they are, we do not think it should take any Christian voter very long to decide as to how his vote shall be cast, providing he has in his riding the opportunity to cast it for a man who declares himself to be a supporter of the "abolish-the-bar policy" of Mr Rowell.

(Here the Baptist prints Mr Rowell's temperance platform, now so well known):

"We are free to confess that we like the policy enunciated in the above paragraphs; not merely because it is the product of Rowell and his followers, but because we believe it to be what is sorely needed in our province, and because we have the conviction that it is practicable. With such a policy before them, the electors of this province surely cannot but go to the polls on the 29th June in a serious frame of mind, without political bias ruling them, and with the determination to cast their votes in favor of a policy that is aimed at the obliteration of the retail sale of liquor. Never before have the electors of this province had such an opportunity as is presented at this time to remove the detestable traffic in liquor as it abounds in bar rooms and clubs; and it is not too much to hope that both Liberals and Conservatives who are in favor of prohibitory measures regarding the liquor traffic will join forces to the extent of sending men to the Legislature who will support Mr Rowell's temperance policy."
