Pastor is Unshamed

Warm Reply to Sir James Whitney

Rev. J. W. Magwood, pastor of Euclid Avenue Methodist Church, Toronto, resents the bitter tone assumed by Sir James Whitney the clergy for campaigning against the bar. He has addressed the following open letter to the irate premier, who is showing more ill temper than we had noticed in the recent contest. With such a majority it should have been easy to maintain good humor and serenity of spirit.

"In your statement handed out to the press, re the recent Provincial elections, you make certain remarks concerning the clergyman of the Province who saw fit to serve under your distinguished opponent, which one finds hard to believe actually fell from the lips or pen of the Prime Minister of Ontario. If it be a true, sir, that a man's real character is revealed by his spirit and manner in the hour of victory, then sir, believe me, we have your measure.

The great majority of the clergymen of the province bore themselves in a manner distinctly worthy of their high offices, but a few demagogic clergy men—that's the rub. Now sir, in passing, allow me to say that even a 'demagogic clergy man' is quite as deserving of respect as a 'demagogic' Premier. But, I will admit that it may have been a grave indiscretion for any of us to go into our pulpits on such an occasion without first submitting our manuscripts to your kindly and unbiased (?) censorship and for fear such a thing may happen again, I would suggest that you appoint a commission, whose duty it will be to prepare a few sermons for feeble minded clergymen who ought not to have any convictions of their own, to be preached on such occasions.

And as samples of what such sermons should be, allow me to advise you that some of us have a few which we preached back in 1905 and for which we received due praise from one Jas. P. Whitney by name. These are very valuable documents and are 'worthy of all commendation.' We will gladly place them at the disposal of said Commission.

But, sir, when you say that these clergymen were anxious above all for 'the success of this party move,' you utter a positive and palpable slander against men quite as honorable and conscientious as yourself. Many of these men whom you now abuse were your former supporters and would have been with you on this occasion had you not turned your back upon them and even insulted them when they wished to assist you on matters which, to them are of first and vital importance.

And, again, sir, when you charge that these clergymen used 'intemperate, violent and abusive language,' you only pile slander upon slander. That is the one and conspicuous thing we preachers did not do. We stuck to our policy, 'abolish the bar,' and advocated it with all intensity of conviction, notwithstanding the fact that we were being slandered and abused by the government press and Government speakers from the Premier down.

We are quite willing to admit, hard as it is for us to understand their conduct, that you, sir, had the support of many of the best citizens of Ontario, but we also know that thousands of the best men of the province deserted your standard on this occasion, and, thanks to your abuse, may never return to it again. That you did not feel the desertion of this large army is due to the fact that you, sir, commanded the full support of the liquor forces and allied trades of the Province.

Now, sir, speaking for myself, — and I am quite sure that my fellow clergymen could tell the same experience—allow me to say that I am utterly unrepentant and stand unabashed and unshamed, happier on this occasion, to be with the victors, than to be with the vanquished. I spoke some 18 times in various parts of the province and there is not a single statement or appeal that I made that I would recall now if I could, and believe me hon. sir, that under the same leader and for the same cause, I am ready for the fray again.

For it isn't the fact that you're licked that counts, but how did you fight and why?"
