Pinkerton Escapes

Our usually orderly town has had quite a sensation the past week, caused by a young lad of 18, Reg. Pinkerton, who culminated his adventures by escaping from jail here early Saturday morning, and has not yet been recaptured.

Last Thursday evening complaint was made to Constable Pettigrew that Pinkerton was drunk and disorderly and using profane language on main street, and when the cop appeared on the scene, he was among a bunch in the lane next McLellan's implement shop.

Last Friday Mr. Pettigrew moved him to a cleaner cell, but the lad was reluctant to change and in transferring him, when the constable relaxed his grip, made a dash across the street for liberty.

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On Monday the constable was led to suspect the prisoner was out at a former neighbor of the family in Egremont and went out to make an investigation.

Should the boy be recaptured, a two-year sentence for jail breaking is, we are informed, the minimum punishment that can be given.

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The Late Alexander Bell

On Saturday, 25th July, 1914, Alexander Bell, died at the home of his daughter-in-law, Mrs. John Bell, Glenelg, three miles east of Durham, where for five years past he has been cared for in a weakness.

Alexander Bell was born in Co. Antrim, Ireland, about 12 miles from Belfast in 1830 and came to Canada in 1847, living about 14 months in Hamilton.

He married Miss Susan Lawrence, the officiating clergyman being the late Alex. Stewart.

He was a member of the Presbyterian church. He is being buried to-day, Wednesday, Rev. Mr. Wylie, Baptist pastor, conducting the services in the absence of Rev. Mr. Whaley.

A Striking Change

For a number of years past about this time, the railways were appealing to Eastern Canada for help to remove the Western harvest.
