THE WAR—DAY BY DAY

FRIDAY

The British Fleet has engaged the enemy who is reported retiring to the Dutch coast.

The Amphion, a British cruiser, struck a German mine and was sunk with a loss of 180 men.

It is announced officially that the east coast of England, London to Hull is safe for British shipping and fishing vessels may go as far north as Ireland.

The bravery of the Belgians in repulsing the enemy at Liege is being commented on everywhere.

Italy is fully determined not to join Germany. Her sympathy is with Britain and France, and before long will likely give help.

An attempt to wreck a Canadian Northern train by dynamite is being ascribed to an enemy.

The Mauretania and Cedric, two ocean liners, headed from New York, found themselves being chased and turned for Halifax, escorted by the British cruiser Essex.

The Nobis is being rushed in its equipment and would be a strong defence had it not been neglected.

The British House of Commons has passed unanimously a war budget of \$500,000,000.

Canada's offer of an expeditionary force has been gratefully accepted.

SATURDAY

The brave Belgians are still holding back the Germans at Liege. The delay has been of the utmost importance to the Allies, for French troops have now come to their aid.

Unexpected, but gratifying news is that British troops are already on the continent. The silence and celerity with which this has been accomplished points to Kitchener's methods.

German war vessels that had taken refuge in Mesina, Italy, were ordered away or remained tied up till end of the war. They went and appealed to Austria by wireless for protection against British cruisers.

Germany has no anxiety as to food supply. The Bank of England has reduced its rate to 5 per cent. Britain will spend millions on road building to help the unemployed, so the weight of the war is not yet crushing.

Notwithstanding reports of naval engagements the British Admiralty declares the rival fleets have not met so far. A bureau has been established to give out only reliable news.

The Premier of France has appealed to the women to complete the gathering of the crops, and a report says Lloyd George promises that the government will see to the harvesting of British crops.

Despatches received on Sunday tell of a bloody battle in Alsace with 30,000 Germans and 15,000 French killed and wounded, also that King Albert was not only holding his own in Belgium, but was trying a flanking movement.

MONDAY

The Admiralty announced that the Germans were attempting to damage the British fleet by submarines. No British ship was injured but one German submarine was sunk.

The French have invaded Alsace and driven the enemy back. The town of Liege has been taken by the Germans but not the forts.

British troops are landing in France and will immediately line up with French and Belgians. Eyon London did not know they had started. A Kitchener touch.

Canada will give a gift of one million bags of flour to Britain, to be distributed by the Government as they see fit. This appropriate spectacular gift has called forth warmest expressions of gratitude.

Unconfirmed reports say the Rainbow is in touch with a German cruiser.

TUESDAY

Nothing very striking in the situation. Absolute silence from the sea, except that British fishermen are advised to keep to the harbour. The calm before a storm perhaps.

France has declared war on Austria, because her troops are in Germany, and thus strengthening that country. The Kaiser is said to be planning to take charge of the Belgian campaign himself, an indication that the brave and successful defence of Liege has been a painful surprise to his Majesty.

Liege town is in German hands, but the forts are yet in the hands of the Belgians and likely to remain so for French and British troops have reached the scene and will back the brave Belgians.

It appears the Germans lose so heavily at Liege, because they stuck to the old process of self formation. British learned her lesson in the Boer War. Modern weapons favor the defence.

Lord Kitchener has called for another 100,000 volunteers. While everyone was wondering how the first set would cross the channel, out came the report that 22,000 were already on French or Belgian soil!

Kitchener way!

Much apprehension is held as to danger to Canadian coast, but nothing untoward has yet occurred.

British to-day enters on the second week of the war with high courage. The failure of the Germans in their

rush to France through Belgium has had a rousing moral effect on the Allies and a corresponding depressing effect on Germany.

The invasion of Alsace by France proved so easy that a trap is feared. The Alsatians are delirious with joy. Map and more war news on inside pages.

Liege.

Liege is a city of 225,000 and has a long, lively history, like other Belgian towns. In population it ranks third after Brussels and Antwerp.

The chief industry is the manufacture of cannons and firearms, very useful there for the moment.

The history of Liege in the Middle Ages was a wrangle between bishops inclined to be despotic and the free burghers. The long struggles of the Liege men against their reverend liege lord are suggestive of Belgian affairs today.

Only last year the general strike was called into play to wrest a democratic constitution from the clerical powers in that country.

It was in 1838 that the Belgian Government began the adequate fortifications of Liege. The Germans find the twelve forts troublesome enough.

These Christian Nations

After two thousand years of Christianity, the world is involved in the most terrible struggle in its history.

Every man among the 20,000,000 who may be fighting in the next few weeks or months is a product of the Christian era. The Kaiser, upon whom, by the common judgment of the world, responsibility for the cataclysm is placed, is a religious man.

His personal life has been blameless and a model for all Europe. He is a devout and regular church-goer. Rarely does he make a public speech that contains no handsome reference to the Deity.

To-day he is calling for the blessing of God upon the German arms, and the heavens have not opened to destroy him. Yet for all the influence Christianity seems to have had upon the Emperor of Germany, the Prince of Peace might never have walked the earth.

Christianity must be reckoned a failure in the affairs of nations as long as it countenances and supports a system of government that places in the hands of a manman like William of Germany the power to plunge the world in war. But the darkest hour is before the dawn.

The savagery of militarism is now making its last stand, and the noblest part of the new era that will be prepared for humanity when the war is over, will be a new significance for Christianity as a factor in the affairs of mankind.—Mail and Empire.
