One of the changes effected by the Balkan war is the gradual elimination of the harem from the territory in the Balkans which has passed

from under Turkish control. There is scarcely an institution in the Orient in regard to which there are more misconceptions than the Turkish harem. It is the general opinion in the west that the harem of the average Turk may be of any size desired; that polygamy is limitless all over Turkey and that there is virtually no social life. However, the home life of the average Mohammedan is ideal, and the share taken by the three wives (for at three the limit is set for everyone but the Sultan) in the management of the household makes the burden of good housekeeping so light that the Turkish dames necessarily have time to
