Treatment of Stinking Smut of Wheat

Numerous inquiries are being received by the Dept. of Agriculture at Markdale for the treatment of Stinking Smut of wheat. The following treatment is being recommended: Secure a one pound bottle of formalin (one pound equals one pint) and mix with water in the proportion of one pound of formalin to forty-two gallons of water.

Great care must be taken to see that the treated seed is not reinfected with smut spores. Sacks, bins, implements, etc., used in handling smutted grain must also be disinfected. The sacks may be boiled or dipped in a strong solution of formalin (1 pint to 10 gallons) and the seed drills should be cleaned and disinfected with formalin or sir-slaked lime.

If the seed wheat to be treated contains banded grains "smut balls" they must be removed before treating the grain. This can be done by placing the grain about a bushel at a time in a tub of water. The smut balls, being light, will skim to the surface and can be skimmed off.

Sprinkling with one-half pint of formalin to five gallons of water is also very satisfactory. With the treatment the grain should be carefully stirred until thoroughly moistened. The formalin treatment will not kill the Loose Smut of Wheat, but is very satisfactory for treating Loose Smut of Oats.

The next effective remedy for this troublesome insect is pyrethrum insect powder—one pound thoroughly mixed with four pounds of flour and placed in an eight-gallon jar or can for twenty-four hours, so that the poison may become thoroughly incorporated with the flour. The mixture can be applied with a powder gun or a cheese cloth bag, dusting the plants lightly. This powder will kill the insects, but it is perfectly harmless to human beings.
