

The Difference.

The distinction between a "state of war" and a "declaration of war" is confusing to the lay reader. Declaration of a state of war, according to international custom, is formal information published to the world that neutrals and all others must take cognizance of exceptional conditions in the country extending the notice; that many of the rights and privileges accorded in time of complete understanding between governments are thereby abrogated. While notice of a state of war does not precessarily nor often specify what not necessarily nor often specify what these rights and privileges are, they are well understood to mean freedom of move-ment by individuals, for one. Passport rights of common prevalence are nulli-fied. Inquisitive activities, especially in the vicinity of fortresses and camps, are certain to result in arrest and incarceration on suspicion that they are the activities of spies. Privately owned property, such as steamships, are liable to be instantly impressed into government service. Mails are liable to deflection and delay because of military exigencies—and Remarkable Coincidences.

Most newspapers that have designated the European trouble by a specific title have referred to it as the "Russo-Austrian War." 
Men of a Good Class are Enrolling in Montreal.

The Size of the Waves .

The most experienced sons of the sea are apt to have very exaggerated ideas of the size of towering waves which break over the vessels during sea storms, and frequently waves are reported as having reached an almost impossible height. As a matter of fact it is extraordinary for a wave to attain a height of seventy feet, while the average size of great waves is considerably less. The mountainous seas often encountered by liners in the North Atlantic usually measure about forty feet, though the upward-shooting, quick-falling watter attains a greater altitude. The big waves of the North Pacific rarely measure more than thirty feet, while the highest wave ever met by an Australian-bound liner in the South Pacific reached fifty feet. The big waves of mid-ocean are much larger than those encountered elsewhere, and it is very rare that a height of even twenty feet is reached by a wave in the Mediterranean.
