THE WAR—DAY BY DAY

THURSDAY, 13th AUG.

So thoroughly has the Atlantic been scoured that the trade routes are declared again safe. The Admiralty report says "the enemy's ships will be hunted continually and though some time may elapse before all are run down they will be kept too busy to do much mischief."

The ferret around Liege, Belgium, are still intact.

Britain is now at war with Austria Hungary for the first time in history and if her ships venture to sea the allies will make short work of them.

The aeroplane in war has come to stay. Both sides have them soaring high above danger, but able to make observations of army movements. A surprise is now scarcely possible.

The Pacific coast of Canada is endangered by German cruisers Leipzig and Nürnberg. Their speed is superior to the Rainbow but their armament is inferior. They have been sighted several times.

In spite of strict censorship, enough news is leaking out to show that Germany is advancing through Belgium though meeting with unexpected obstacles.

FRIDAY

Britain, France and Russia have made a sharp demand on Turkey to become the ally of the British Empire. Turkey retorts that Britain took possession of two of her vessels building in British ship yards when war broke out. The cases are not exactly similar but enough so to make a cry of and one writer predicts a Moslem war if Turkey is humbled.

The despatches are suspiciously favorable to the Allies. If "German driven back at all points," "German arms right wing retreating," "The French captured 12,000 prisoners," &c. are correct why this little item? "German army slowly advancing across Belgium towards Brussels. The news is heavily censored."

Holland is reported preparing for war and Japan would dearly like some one to hit her in the face. South Africa will coal British ships free.

The British National relief fund is now over \$5,000,000.

SATURDAY

Nothing strikingly new. Terrible stories of suffering, destruction and rape, caused by the inhuman haste of the German invader are reaching the public.

The week closes with silence on the North Sea, German fleet supposed to be "bottled up," the Japanese fleet sails with sealed orders, an armed German steamer reported destroyed on Lake Nyasa, Central Africa. Surely a world wide war and scarcely three weeks' old! It seems a war of the little peoples. The Servians have it said, repulsed 400,000 Austrians and the Belgians have won undying honors.

MONDAY

"Get out of China," is Japan's ultimatum to Germany. The latter has until next Sunday to decide whether she will dismantle her forts at Kiau Chau, disarm her ships and withdraw from Eastern Asia. Germany surely won't and Japan will clear her out.

Germany has a 99-year lease of Kiau Chau, and Japan intends to give it back to China, whether at the end of 99 years or not is not certain. Reading between the lines British statesmen seem to fear that Japan may "get the habit" of turning out European squatters in China and the United States is inclined to resent Japanese activity.

Germany disgraced herself by executing the great socialist leader Dr. Liebknecht and now come reports that a revolt is spreading among indignant Socialists over the outrage.

An engagement without precedent seems imminent along 300 miles of battlefield and may last a week or two. Sir John French and the French General have met but not known where. No matter which leads, the Allies will have a "French" Leader anyway.

The Atlantic is now declared safe for all shipping, so effective has been the British clearing process. Travelers are clearing the mines from the North Sea, but what of the fleets? Nothing.

Turkey and Greece are having trouble. Servia is attacking Bosnia, with the good-will of the inhabitants, Russia is promising to restore certain rights to the Poles, Sweden is said to be mobilizing, any old country that is not thinking of war is behind in these gory times.

TUESDAY

A German warship reported sunk off Canary Islands. Germans said to be massing men near Waterloo, Jap Cruiser on the trail of a German ship. British cruiser Glasgow captured a Hamburg steamship sailing to South American ports, with \$1,000,000 cargo.

Brazil has demanded from Germany an explanation of abuse, given to a prominent Brazilian and his wife. Will South America enter the fray?

Britain, France, Belgium and of course Germany, have absolutely prohibited war correspondents from the forces in the field.

Belgium has moved her capital from Brussels to Antwerp.

Japan, to the relief of Britain and United States, has intimated her intention to confine her anti-German action to the China Sea and Chinese coasts.

The Russian advance on Austria has been checked and the latter have invaded Russia.

A Loyal Utterance.

The Midway correspondent of the Aytan Adyanos reports a stirring patriotic sermon delivered by Rev. J. L. Halim, of Aytan, from which we give this extract:

"In this critical hour in the history of the British Empire he said, it was our plain duty, nay more, it was our imperative duty as British subjects to prove our Loyalty if needs be, in defending the Empire, of which we form no small part, against the invasion of the enemy. He said the British Empire being at war we are at war. We should be loyal and patriotic and should if called upon, sacrifice even the last drop of our blood in the defence of our homes. It was not for us to decide, he said, the justification of the declaration of war because of these higher in authority, would have to answer to that charge, and our duty was to be subject to those in authority over us. It behooved us as Catholics to view the situation from a Christian standpoint. Loyalty and patriotism were Christian virtues. Catholics in every land and clime recognize these virtues as religious duties. He was positive that the Kaiser had no more loyal and patriotic soldiers than his Catholic subjects, but being British subjects, it mattered not whether by birth or naturalization, whether we were born in France or Germany, in Austria or in Russia, if we had sworn to recognize forever our allegiance to that foreign power, we were as truly British Subjects as if born in England."

He touched on the laudable and admirable stand taken by the Irish people in this crisis. With the cry of "civil war" on the lips of the statesmen of that country, with two warring factions, preparing for a conflict after exhausting every possible means of a peaceful settlement of their grievances with His Majesty's and the Prime Minister's avowed inability to effect a compromise. Suddenly the bolt descends from a heretofore clear blue sky and the foundations of the British Empire are threatened. What then? Carson and Redmond, the two political rivals, almost enemies, shake hands and say "ours is but a minor squabble, we'll settle it some other time, we must first preserve the integrity of the British Empire."

American War Sentiment

Accusations having been made by a few prominent Germans that there was Anti-German sentiment among the people the New York Tribune makes a crushing reply. It points out that only the best feeling prevails towards the German citizen, but has only condemnation for the German Government and its militarist policy, that is working havoc in Europe and bringing Germany face to face with ruin. It accuses it of starting the cry of war preparation by its "year of sacrifice," says it could have held back Austria when Serbia humbled itself and so nipped the war spurt in the bud. But no: the Kaiser looked on and practically challenged the world.

The article closes thus: "The nations of the triple entente went into the fight with reluctance that showed some sense of their responsibility as civilized powers. But the German Government flung Germany in without counting the costs, without even stopping to find out where its ally, Italy stood; eager to strike the first blow with that huge engine of destruction in which it had such mad confidence."

American public opinion is outraged by the wanton attack on the weak neutral power of Belgium and the slaying of its subjects. It recalls at the cost of what the Kaiser has undertaken. It has no sympathy with the excuse that it is a war of self-preservation for Germany. That is a militarist delusion. Under peace Germany was outstripping its rivals, billing England with anxiety on the sea and putting out of the head of France its cherished visions of a regained Alsace and Lorraine.

American opinion feels that the best thing that can happen to the world is to have the German militarist idol shattered and thrown down in the dust. Without the least feeling against the German people, that is how the American public feels about the present German Government and its works, and that sentiment is rightly reflected in the American press.

—The Kaiser thought it would just be a morning's stroll through Belgium before his day's work began in France. He knows better now.

Contentment is What we Need

Every man is as big as his wants are little. If he can get along without other people, other people count not against him. If he can find ample music within his own soul he will discover entertainment in everything and everywhere. If one big book like the Bible, like Shakespeare, is a library for him, he will be able to extract profit from all books. If any tree fashions for him a perpetual art gallery, he will walk in what we lack that makes us unhappy, it is what we think we need. Contentment is the richest possession and self-reliance is the fundamental power. This is because the kingdom of God is within us and not outside us and so our most precious goods and our strongest resources are there. Happy is the man that understands these things and is not led away by the temptations of exterior.

Sing it Right.

While glorying in the fact that Britain's supremacy on the sea is unquestioned and that the supremacy is not used for aggression, we think it most unwise that great writers and good men should use such terms as "Mistress of the seas," "Lord of the ocean," &c. The arrogance of such phrases leads to irritation and ill-feeling and might far better be repressed. We like to sing "Britannia rule the waves," but not "Britannia rules the waves" as is so commonly done. The poet's words as he wrote them were:

"When Britain first at heaven's command Arose from out the azure main, This was the charter, the charter of the land And guardian angels sang the strain. Rule Britannia, Britannia rule the waves, &c. See the point? The charter given to her by heaven was a command that she was to "rule the waves." She's doing it, but there's no need to be irritating about it. Merit it ever tudest."
