THE WAR—DAY BY DAY

Last Thursday the Germans started to occupy Brussels, which event has in it more of glitter than glory for the Belgians as a tactical move had evacuated it, not being suited for defence.

Friday's despatches tell of a French reverse in Lorraine, but the French had retaken Muehlenhausen and 24 guns. Canada's war budget is out and increased excise and customs duties are to be imposed on liquor, alcoholic preparations, tobacco, coffee, sugar and fruit extracts.

Saturday's despatches tell of the bombardment of Namur, which is stronger than Liege. The Belgians from Brussels retired to Antwerp, which is reckoned impregnable, but will likely be attacked.

Monday brings news that the great battle is in progress and British troops engaged with the French in southern Belgium.

TUESDAY "A Serious Repulse for the Allies" is the all absorbing message to-day.

The war office censor calls it a "retirement" of the British and French troops near Mons in Belgium. It appears they were taking the offensive and have again occupied their positions.

Alsace and Lorraine have been taken from the French and on the whole the advantage of the day is with Germany. One may admire the tremendous fighting machine while wishing it were employed in the cause of freedom.

The aged Emperor Francis Joseph is reported dying in the midst of the storm he raised. Austria-Hungary is not fighting with the same bitterness as her partner, and may soon have Italy sniping at her heels.

British and Japanese forces are co-operating in the capture of Kiu Chow by land and sea. The Kaiser valued his Asiatic foothold as the apple of his eye, and may be stripped of it all.

Pope Pius X is Dead Amid all the bare and excitement of war came the thrilling news last Thursday that Pius X was dead, his end hastened without a doubt by the spectacle of Christian nations forgetting every peace maxim of the great Founder of Christianity and flying at each other's throats.

Almost his last conscious act was to address an exhortation to the faithful of all lands to pray that the thoughts of men might be turned in the direction of the Prince of Peace.

Two of his sisters, to whom he was devoted, ministered to him and one of them two days later followed him to the great beyond, overcome with grief and excitement. He had been Pope for seven years and in that time battled against modernism and had ruptures with France, Spain and Portugal.
