WEDNESDAY

A new battle is in progress which will decide the fate of France. The Allies are holding the enemy in check and the Belgians repulsed them near Antwerp. In the big battle, Sunday to Tuesday, the British lost 2000 killed, wounded and prisoners, which is reckoned not bad for the number engaged and the work they did.

Germany is ordering out boys of 16 to 19 years for a course of musketry. Lord Kitchener says Britain may eventually put 30 divisions in the field. In a speech in the House of Lords he dealt plainly with the situation, predicting great sacrifice but ultimate success. A second army of 100,000 is supposed to be ready to cross the channel.

The Germans are plainly trying to reach the coasts of the English channel to prevent the landing of troops, but the Allies are "on to it" to prevent it.

Italy is expected to join the Allies in a few days and she can place 600,000 first-class troops in action.

Time and distance are against Germany. His bold stroke to crush France first, then wheel round on Russia, has failed, thanks to the Belgians. Russia is getting into Prussia and on the whole as we go to press the position is hopeful. Terms of peace must be settled in Berlin, the Emperor removed and such conditions made that never again can the world witness such a waste of human life and achievement.
