Young People's Institute at Priceville.

At a meeting of the Presbytery of Orangeville, Sept. 18th, it was agreed to hold a Young People's Institute at the first place mentioned for each of the following groups:

(a) Priceville, Swinton Park, Durham Road, Fiesherston, Egenia.

(b) Dundalk, Proton, Ventry, Riverview, Corbetton.

(c) Grand Valley, South Luther, Tabert, Laurel, Black's Corners, Waldemar.

(d) Kaldon, Kingscote, Levensdale

It is hoped Sessions will enthusiastically open their Church doors and do all in their power to aid in this effort. Both the General Assembly and the Synod recommend this course. These Institutes are intended to unite Presbyterian Young People to meet present urgent conditions. Through them we aim to perfect the mobilization of all our young forces to defend the right and suppress the wrong. All in the various groups, whether members of organizations or not, are invited to rally at these points and will be made welcome at other meeting places also, as well as their own. The centres are easily reached by conveyance, so, it is expected all will go. The mode of entertainment is left to each group. Sometimes the entertainment is provided by those who are visited, at other times all follow the picnic style and bring their baskets along.

British Missionary Boards have just said to the German and French Boards who seem to have dropped their Missionary efforts. "We will finance your Missionary Work till the close of the war." This is magnanimous, fraternal. It is surely next to Calvary's Cross where our Lord virtually said I will support you through all the campaign against sin. There is the Christ idea put in practice.
