The New Premier

With surprising celerity a successor to the late Sir James Whitney has been appointed, the new premier being W. H. Hearst. The News says Hon. Mr. Hanna declined the position, but just who proposed it to him and who selected Hearst is not quite clear. Certain it is the rank and file of the Conservative members have had no say in the choice of their leader and had they had their say Leas and not Hearst would likely have been chosen. Rumors are rife of dictation from Ottawa. Finlay McDiarmid, West Elgin, is appointed Minister of Public Works, to succeed Dr. Reame, resigned. Hon. Adam Beck has left the Cabinet.

Under New Leadership

(Special to the Review) Toronto, Oct. 5, 1914

Most conspicuous in many respects is the opening of the Hearst regime. The chief difficulty comes from adverse criticism in the ranks of the Conservatives themselves. Some of the Government papers look upon the new era not as a Hearst administration so much as a Cochrane-Hearst regime.

It seems to be an admitted fact that the appointment of a successor to Sir James Whitney instead of being made democratically by a caucus of the Conservative members of the Legislature, was arranged from Ottawa. Even the Toronto News (Conservative) excuses this on the ground that Sir James Whitney himself always regarded the Conservative party in Ontario as part of a national organization. This is not fair to Sir James Whitney's deserved reputation for independence but it is a line of defence made necessary by the embarrassing position in which the Government is now put. The World and the Telegram, both Conservative, are out-spoken in their protests against the interference from Ottawa.

The former refers to Cochrane's nomination (now Prime Minister) as a "patron" man and the latter exclaimed "surely the members of the Ontario Legislature are big enough to resent meddling from Ottawa."

Of interest equal to the appointment of Prime Minister is the disappearance of Adam Beck from the Cabinet. It is over as the Government is undoubtedly trying to do, it is easy to see that public opinion throughout the province is suspicious. Cochrane has always been regarded as a "corporation" politician. Indeed, the Telegram says openly that at Ottawa he has been more of a hindrance than a help to the Hydro Electric policy. It is this man's nomination, this man's "Friday" who is now Prime Minister. Does this not go a long way to explain Beck's absence from the Government? Sir Adam to-day is only a private member. His influence is that much reduced and this curtailment of his power is unpopular with the people.

Hon. W. J. Hanna, formerly the chief man in the limelight and the acknowledged successor to Sir James Whitney when the latter would retire, is strangely out of the maelstrom these days. The "Proudfoot" and "Snider" investigations have made a big change for the Provincial Secretary, a change which must to him be most unwelcome.

The War

There is positively little new to add from last week's statement. The two armies are still lined up in their long front and though the allies have made progress in their turning movement on their left wing, the situation calls to mind the debate of the schoolmen of the middle ages 'what happens when an irresistible force comes against an immovable body?'

The turning movement of the Allies has brought them near the Belgian border and our military critic thinks there is a possibility of Joffre's forces being too much drawn out. Tuesday's papers say they had to concede some ground though the result was "indecisive."

The Germans are hammering away at Antwerp's defenses. Captured three forts says Berlin, forts all intact, say the Belgians. Take your choice. If the Kaiser could only capture Antwerp he would assuredly say "Keep your old Paris, who wants it."

Two mighty Russian armies are marching slowly ahead and making more progress than the allies in France—"Berlin by Christmas" is their cry.

Britain is resorting to mine laying at the Dover Straits, in the Thames estuary and at Ostend. This will free many protecting ships and men. Indian troops landed in France and are now in the fighting line. Before some of our readers peruse this paper the Canadian force will have landed.

Portugal is reported to be now helping Britain. Turkey is out for Germany, Italy and Greece will help the allies. It will soon be, not what nations are at war? but what nations are not. Armageddon.

If the Club were responsible in this case, then it would be responsible for all the damage done in the Township of Gleng on the nights of their meetings? Is this fair?

There is another side to the story as hinted at in your paper. Both the proprietor and the lessee of the farm in question knew that the boys were putting their horses in the stables on the evening of Farmers' Club meetings yet neither of them said one word about the matter. They had the gates wired and the doors barred, so they say, and on several occasions were the fences torn down and the doors broken open, yet they said nothing. You state that the Club should see that vandalism be stopped, yet how can they even assist in the matter when they know nothing about what is going on?

No one likes to see his neighbor lose a good cow or have his place wrecked, and the members of the Farmers' Club are no exception to this rule. At the same time those who had damage done to their property should have wisely refrained from threatening the Club to a suit for damages if they did not immediately pay or assist in paying for damage done. This threat was given and as the Club could not see their way clear to take funds from their treasury to assist in this, nothing was done at the time.

It is to be hoped that the young men who made the mistake of doing the damage will be men enough to come forward and assist in paying the expenses.
