### The Roll Call.

MATTHEW JAMES ALLAN  
On Saturday last, 17th inst., Matthew James Allan passed away, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Robt. Allan of town and for many years of the 4th con, Glenelg. For the past five years or more, Mr. Allan has been an invalid. Before an attack of typhoid fever five years ago he was an industrious young man and was a competent stone mason. His siege of typhoid left him in a weak condition, which brought on a paralytic stroke which left him in a quite helpless state up to the time of his death. He was in his 40th year.

Four brothers and two sisters are left to comfort the parents; Herb, on the homestead, George across the road, John and Joe in the west. Mrs. Hiram Dean and Mrs. Hawley Hays in Durham.

Interment took place Sunday to Durham cemetery, 75-brother Foresters marching in a body to the grave. Rev. S. M. Whaley conducted appropriate services at home and grave. The pall bearers were Messrs. Geo., Anson and Jas. Lloyd and Messrs. John Will and Chas. Ritchie, all Foresters.

On Friday last at the home of his brother-in-law, Rev. Mr. Wylie, the above gentleman passed away in his 40th year. He has been in Canada but eighteen months, coming from Dalry, Ayrshire, Scotland, to Goderich, where Rev. Mr. Wylie (Mrs. Mansell's brother) was stationed. He came to Durham, seventeen weeks ago, with wife and daughter in poor health and has gradually declined since.

Deceased was little known to Durham people but was a man of strong mentality, and an earnest worker along church lines, both in Scotland and in Goderich, finding congenial scope for his activities in both Presbyterian and Baptist churches. His mother, two sisters and a brother, all in Scotland, survive him. He was interred in Durham cemetery on Sunday last, Rev. Mr. Whaley conducting an impressive service. The pall bearers were Messrs. Hamilton Allen, H. Burnett, Jesse Hughes, Wm. Moffat, John Ritchie, Fred Search.
