THE WAR SITUATION

We had gone to press last week when word came of a disaster to a British squadron off the coast of Chile, two cruisers Good Hope and Monmouth having been sunk with serious loss of life by a German squadron of three. Craddock, the Admiral, went down in the Good Hope.
