THE WAR SITUATION

We had gone to press last week when word came of a disaster to a British squadron off the coast of Chile, two cruisers Good Hope and Monmouth having been sunk with serious loss of life by a German squadron of five ships, the British number three. Cradock, the Admiral, went down in the Good Hope. British and Japanese squadrons are scouring the Pacific to find the enemy.

As an offset the German cruiser Emden, that has wrought much havoc in the Indian Ocean has been sunk near Java by the Australian cruiser Sydney and the Kongsberg another German marauder has been put out of business in East Africa, so practically the only German menaces on the sea are those in the Pacific. The main fleet is kept powerless in the North Sea.

Tsing Tau has been handed over to Japan, and the German press is most bitter. The German dream of colonial expansion has vanished by this war. Japan is desirous of sending warships to help the Allies in Europe and would send troops if asked. Better not make her feel too important.

Russia is carrying the war into Germany in a wonderful way, her speed in advancing is surprising all military men. She aims, now that Turkey has joined Germany, to make a rush for Constantinople as well as to Berlin, and it will likely prove true as Asquith says, that Turkey has committed suicide.

The German campaign in Flanders has failed, the attempt to break through the allies' lines to reach Calais has failed, the efforts to capture Verdun in the east has failed and before long, the Germans must retire from France to some new fighting base. The Kaiser seems determined to hold on to Ostend, Zeebrugge and Antwerp, Belgian ports.

The Canadians may soon be sent forward, Kitchener still calls for more men and it is a possibility that conscription may be introduced into Britain again.

Egypt and the canal is still safe, Italy still neutral. The Kaiser's efforts to stir Mohammedan feeling is a failure. Asquith in a great speech has confirmed their loyalty by declaring that Britain would fight to defend their holy places.
