THE WAR SITUATION

Still nothing absolutely decisive. The long drawn out battle line through Belgium and Northern France is still intact, the enemy with the fury of desperation trying to find weak spots but finding none.

That Britain owes much to Belgium, France and Russia just now, is certain. If the Kaiser could make a reasonable peace with them, allowing him a free hand against hated England, the chances are he would do it.

Some cavalry and engineering sections of the Canadian forces are now in France. It is thought, but for a few days mystery will surround them and they may be in France before we know it.

A naval calamity of magnitude has befallen the British people. The super-dreadnought, Audacious, third largest battleship in the British navy was reported by "Mail" advices to have struck a mine on north coast of Ireland, and went to the bottom, though remaining afloat long enough to allow of all hands being saved by the lunar Olympic and other craft nearby.

Tuesday's despatches say Craconv is in flames and inhabitants fleeing before the Russians. A great battle is impending between the Russian and German armies. At three points the Russians are on German soil.

Some naval actions are daily expected near the South American coast and it need surprise no one if Japanese vessels and even soldiers should make their appearance in European waters.

25,000 additional Indian troops arrived in France on Thursday. The Khedive of Egypt will be said to lead the Turkish army.

Sir Robt. Borden after a month in Virginia, is in Ottawa again and with his Cabinet is busy making arrangements for the training and moving of the second contingent.

The British Parliament has voted over one billion dollars as a war loan the expense at present being nearly \$5,000,000 a day. Not one dissenting vote to this enormous vote which will last for about 225 days.

Strenuous Camp Life

Britain's Soldiers Must Undergo

A few weeks ago we published a letter from a relative stationed at Dunnet Head, Scotland, guarding the coast. A letter from him tells of him and his command undergoing stiff training before going to the front.

Our whole Division has signed for active service and we await the time impatiently when we will get to the front. We have little time to ourselves as, apart from training, we have various duties to perform.

is our day's work: Revellie at 5.30, breakfast 6.30, parade with full pack 7.30. We usually do outpost, company attack and defence, and from 10 to 12 miles marching. To-day and yesterday we completed a trench 30 yards long, 3 ft deep, breastwork 3 ft high and 2 1/2 ft broad and went five miles into the country to do it.

Back at 1.30 p.m. dinner (sometimes bully and hard biscuits) at two o'clock. Parade again, 3 till 4.30 for drill. Tea at 5.15, lecture on war from 6.30 till 7.15, bed at 10, lights out 10.30. We have to clean our arms during that 24 hours. Not much time to lark or write, eh!

One morning we were awakened in our billets at 1 o'clock. We dressed half sleeping and in record time with full equipment, emergency rations, and 100 rounds of ammunition. Didn't know what had happened or where we were going. We fell in with the whole Division of 12,000 men and acted as a rear guard on a march of 22 miles, getting back to Falkirk at 8 o'clock. All the men seem fit and I don't think they will disgrace the flag when called on. Expecting another alarm any night, each section takes turn about, sleeping with all clothes on, so as to be prepared to waken the billets when the alarm goes. We are going to have 3 days' manoeuvres next week and in addition to pack each man carries a blanket and rations and have to cook our own food.

We have all been vaccinated and will be inoculated to-morrow; that means two days of enteric fever. Discipline is most strict now, no excuses. One lad got four months in Strling barracks for saying "No" to an officer. It is hard to be so strict with the men, perhaps they have been chums for years past - personally, I have been threatened with every sort of torture when the war is over, but times are different now and as they must learn to obey an order at once.

16-10-14. - Three days now since I started this sermon and I write now in excellent spirits I don't think. I have been inoculated, but feel as if I had been wrestling Jack Johnston, stiff all over. We have to lie in today and not get cold, or serious trouble might follow. I think the war office means to kill us before the Germans get us. Seven of us in this room and the doctor paid us a visit to see if we were very bad. He found your humble servant banging at the piano with mouth wide open and an agonized expression and the other six joining in with more or less musical voices! I will give the blarney on the doctor's remarks. I hope to get a week end home to-morrow, first in 11 weeks. I expect I will be rather dubious about getting into a decent bed now and may waken up on the floor in the morning.
