

Weather Reports Forbidden.

The publication of weather re ports has been forbidden by the French government, presumably for ed daily. This has included, of course information useful to mar iners. It is assumed that the government has in mind the possible use of this information by Germany in both naval and military operations along the western littoral. The part that fogs have played in the Belgian coast battles is recalled in this connection. "By order of the government," reads the announcement in the Figaro, "the communication of meterological information is suspended. We are only able therefore to give the temperature of Paris."







