This will be enough at a time of all the original given here. We find the names of a few living yet. Robert McDonald of lot 40, con 1 S D R, is living yet in some far away country now about 98 years of age.

On the north side lot 20 Alex McGillivray of Bruce is living at the age of about 90 years. Lot 32, con 1, N D R, Donald McCannel, of Boothville, is living yet, aged about 88 years. Lot 49 Neil McEachern, Hopeville, is living yet, aged 95 years, but bedfast for 13 years.

In reviewing all those names of old original pioneers we might make some mistakes but not many. Those who are now owners or occupying those farms will bear in mind that their predecessors had to endure hardships when first coming to prove what kind of a lot he was lucky to get.

In many instances the lot of a good many were east among hills and hollows, were great many were taking them up on sight, unseen. Along the Durham road was given as grant - one person would get a 50 acre lot and it a son was 18 years of age he could get another 50 acres. A great number made a serious mistake that didn't go a little off the Durham road to the south where the farms were somewhat better, but then those people coming in at first thought they were far enough when they had to carry all their provisions on their back from Durham or further. We remember when a boy, a highlander going over north a couple of miles laying on the roadside with 100 lbs of flour across his neck coming from Durham. When asked what was the matter, he said he took a glass of whiskey down the line and it weakened him, having nothing to eat since he left home in the morning, going ten miles, but he said they in gaelic bu shuirich ormsa e, or it is nothing to me. So we see the first of those poor old pioneers.

Intended for last week The good sleighing we had for a few days last week is all gone.

Not much doing since the snow is gone. We heard some one predicting we are going to have lots of bare ground before Xmas and New Years.

We notice some entertainments advertised already to come off at Xmas time. The Sunday School anniversary of the Presbyterian church will be held in the church in this town on the evening of the 23rd December, 1914, when an excellent program will be given, consisting of good singing by the home choir and others. It will be a reminder of those who were little boys and girls fifty years ago of their Sunday School days, that no such thing as an anniversary was kept nor Xmas tree, no choir but some one who could sing the old tune of Martyrdom to the 23rd psalm, endeavored to lead the praise part of the service.

One evening last week a large crowd gathered at the cosy residence of Mr Arch. McCausg, of Top Cliff, consist-

ing of old, young and middle aged, to spend a pleasant evening listening to Mr McBeth with his gramophone and other music as well. Mr McBeth is not at all mean about giving any amount of music and speeches from professional men.

Monday, the 30th Nov., was kind of drizzly all day and disagreeable. Mr George Watson, of this town, got his chopping mill in good running order and is turning out first-class work. Mr Watson will have a planer in the mill after a while.

This kind of weather if it continues will give those behind in their ploughing a chance to catch up to those who finished long ago.

A few from this neighborhood attended the funeral of the late Allan McKinnon this afternoon to the English church cemetery. The funeral was largely attended, considering the unfavorable weather.

Mr McKinnon was a long resident of the township of Egremont and Glenelg, coming when a young lad with his father's family and settled at the Rob Roy, Durham Road, Glenelg, over 60 years ago. We attended the funeral and was delighted by Rev. Whaley's address from the words 'I have fought a good fight etc.' Mr Whaley's manner of addressing is very impressive.
