Ever since the European war began reports have come from Russis of legal restriction of the use of alcoholic beverages on an unprecedented scale. Owing to a historic tendency of Russian government to announce policies in terms that seemed more sweeping than they readers took these reports with considerable reservation.

Closing of vodka shops in places where thousands of men were assembling seemed probable in the inpublic order. That the ban on the nearer. sale of distilled spirits had been made universal seemed doubtful. However, it seems that it has. An Associated Press dispatch affirms it without reservation. It also gives the personal story of Michael Demitrovitch Tchelisheff, the peasant house-painter who won his way to wealth, the mayoralty of Samara and a seat in the duma, who led the movement to success.

He was one of the signatorof the peace conference after the war and later was Minister of Agriculture in the Orange River

Gen. de Wet at the outbreak of the present war offered a corps of South African scouts to Lord Kitchener. Later he protested against the action of the Union of South Africa in fighting the Germans, and took the field against the British
