The War

Interest in the war never flags, though nothing strikingly decisive has occurred of late, except it be the crushing defeat of the Turks in the Caucasus and Russian gains over Austria.

The Allies in France and Belgium are advancing but slowly, but they are advancing.

Germany's planning a big coup to capture Warsaw but the Russians seem confident they can't.

Roumania is practically into the war, Italy is almost ready, Switzerland is massing troops to guard her neutrality.

The United States is giving grave concern. She addressed a protest to Britain for interfering with her commerce in her efforts to prevent contraband from reaching her enemy.

Copper and other munitions of war have been found concealed in cotton bales, the export of copper in November 1914, from the States to neutral countries was more than double that of 1913 and these facts Britain presses home as justification for her right of a search as a means to her own safety.

A large section of the United States headed by Roosevelt is indignant at the remonstrance when trade and dollars are affected, yet the States were silent when Belgium neutrality was violated, even though she was a signatory at the Hague Convention to articles meant to prevent such action.

Toronto Telegram, April 16 1914.—Loyalty to party requires G. Howard Ferguson, M. P. E., to admit as a traitor to himself. The Proudfoot enquiry was throttled by the strong-handed chairmanship of G. Howard Ferguson, M. P. P. The same authority is being operated as a curb on the activity of the Public Accounts Committee, (in the Snider investigations).

3. Ferguson Disqualification Case '14
Toronto World, Conservative.—There are a lot of people in Ontario wondering why Mr G. Howard Ferguson is so indispensable to the Government that special legislation has to be passed to save his political life.
