This enormous expenditure of \$140,000,000 annually must be met by taxes or borrowing and one is compelled to wender if some of the increase in expenditure could not be avoided. A return brought down in Parliament on Friday last is more then disquieting and illustrates one source of increase. In the last four year the total number of dismissals from office was 2115, while the appointments reached the enormous total of 10576.
