Opening Week in Legislature

Sir James Whitney The House adjourned on Wednesday after tributes of respect to the memory of the late Sir James Whitney had been paid by the new Prime Minister, the Leader of the Opposition and other members of the House.

Close Bars in War Mr Rowell formally made his offer to the Government to co-operate with them in closing all drinking places during the war and then to submit to a majority vote of the people the question of whether these drinking places are ever to be re-opened or not.

Moratorium Bill Hon. Mr Lucas, the new Attorney General, introduced the Moratorium Bill. The action of this measure is confined to mortgages and agreements of sale on real estate and does not apply to commercial paper or personal debts.

Mr Rowell is not recognized by the Liberal party in the House. This is shown by the fact that a caucus of the Liberal members has already been held and Mr Rowell was not invited to be present.

Notes \$50,000 will be set aside from the New Ontario Development Fund to provide seed grain for settlers in that country.

Mr Rowell has asked for returns of all correspondence between the Provincial Governments with regard to nickel, its export and the possibilities of its being used by His Majesty's enemies.

The Standard Bank of Canada
