

# OUTER FORTS HAVE FALLEN

## Gateway of Dardanelles is Secured by Fleet of the Allies

A despatch from London says the reduction of all the forts at the entrance of the Dardanelles by the Anglo-French battleship squadron was announced in a statement issued by the Official Press Bureau. The allied fleet was able to attack the Turkish forts at close range. Rapid developments in the situation are expected, as the Admiralty states that the operations are being continued. The combined Anglo-French fleet, which consists of 32 ships, has been bombarding the positions at the entrance of the straits intermittently for more than two months. The feat is regarded in official circles here as one of the most important accomplishments of the allied powers since the beginning of the war, and predictions are freely heard that the fall of Constantinople will come before long. Naval experts, however, admit that this is merely the first step in a stupendous task, and that enormous efforts will be required to force a passage of the rest of the straits, which are lined with strong forts and modern defensive works for a distance of forty miles on both sides. Furthermore, the Turkish fleet, which, under such conditions, is not to be despised, is supposed to be stationed in Nagara roads, at the narrowest part of the waterway, and extensive mine fields have been planted at strategic points. The allied fleet is under command of Vice-Admiral Carden, and is the strongest aggregation of warships on the allied side with the exception of the British home fleet. It comprises vessels of all classes, including submarines and destroyers, and has a strong detachment of aeroplanes and sea-planes conveyed by the aeroplane ship, Ark Royal.

### BITS OF NEWS FROM THE MARITIME PROVINCES.

#### Items of Interest From Places Lapped by Waves of the Atlantic.

Urgah Drake, of the City Assessors' office, St. John, N.B., has held that position for 42 years. Herrings are very plentiful in North and Middle Anns, Bay of Islands, Newfoundland. It is predicted that 100,000,000 feet of logs will be cut in the New Brunswick woods this season. In one week, in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, fire losses reached a total of more than \$175,000. At Spruce Lake, N.B., a large 40-room building, intended to be used as a hotel, was mysteriously burned.

Capt. William George Hemeon, who died at Liverpool, N.S., was harbor and shipping master of that port. Hon. W. B. Dickson, speaker of the N.B. Legislature, is in poor health and will be unable to attend the session.

When the Aberdeen school was burned at Moncton, N.B., pupils lost school books to the value of \$2,000 or more. The *Lebanberg*, N.S., schooner, fleetly, had to be abandoned at sea. Her crew were taken off by a British steamer.

Kenneth Bain, of the Army Service Corps, St. John, N.B., shot himself through the wrist while cleaning a revolver. At Newcastle, N.B., Hubert Sinclair presented a turkey to the Red Cross Society. It was raffled and \$40.75 realized.

Moncton, N.B., has posted "keep to the left" signs. Formerly the rules of the road provided for keeping to the right. Mayor Balkam, of Milltown, told members of the council to call him "Mr. Mayor." He doesn't like the term "Your Worship."

The city of Fredericton, N.B., wants a representative in the Legislature and will memorialize the Government to that effect. University of New Brunswick students gave a dance in honor of their comrades in the college who have volunteered for the second contingent.

Miss May Fraser, of St. John, N.B., was standing in front of an open fire when her clothing caught and she received injuries which later caused her death. The city council of Moncton, N.B., decided to set aside \$75 each month for the purpose of enforcing the Scott Act. The chief of police will handle the money.

Two Guyboro, N.S., men named Reuben and Fred Perry, were sent to the pen for seven and four years respectively for stealing a heifer and butchering it in the woods. A man named Halley was drowned at North Sydney, and his widow went to a neighbor's house. One night somebody broke into her house and stole the dead man's effects.

At Halifax, a militia officer had a suit case stolen, the contents being worth \$200. James Rooney, a R. C. R. soldier, said to be of Toronto, was arrested and pleaded guilty to stealing it.
