War Losses

Last week we mentioned that some thought the Dardanelles would be forced in three weeks. It looks less likely now.

Last week two British and one French cruisers of the pre-Dreadnought type, were sunk in the Dardanelles. Mine sweepers had it was thought cleared the channel, but the enemy above had set floating mines down stream and these did their work.

Few lives were lost on the British vessels, but an explosion on the French one caused her to go down in three minutes with a loss of perhaps 600 lives.

New vessels have taken the place of the lost ones and the work goes on, but more of this may be looked for before the Allies set foot in the history of Constantinople.

The Turks claim the ships were torpedoed from the shore, and if this be correct it shows that both sides of the channel will have to be overrun with allied troops.

The Kaiser still holds the 20 mile strip of Belgian coastline though Belgians, British and French are nibbling forward. The great onward movement will be due early in April and great losses will no doubt take place.

War Wins

The Russians have scored and notably, by capturing the great Austrian fortress of Przemyel after a siege of 186 days duration. Tremendous efforts were made by Austro-German armies to reach the beleaguered half starved place but too late. Russia will now have over 100,000 fresh soldiers to attack some new place, possibly Czarow.

Memel, on the Baltic, was entered by the Russians, but Berlin reports say that it has been reoccupied. A Zeppelin raid on Paris before daylight proved a distinct failure and these unwieldy craft no longer cause terror.

In 34 days the German submarine raiders have sunk 32 British merchant vessels, mostly of small size. This seems serious enough, on a day almost, but Britain is in no way alarmed.

A great German drive towards Calais is being planned again and will have to be met by British troops largely. They can't get through.

Well Done, Saskatchewan

Premier Scott and his government have made a record which cannot be equalled. It may be duplicated but they have the honor of being first to declare for province wide prohibition of the debasing liquor traffic. Up to July 1, 1915, all bars must close at 7 p. m., after that date they will close and remain closed until the end of the war, and then a vote will be taken to determine whether they shall re-open again. Well done Premier Scott. We will be glad to say "Well done Premier Scott" if he will give us the same opportunity. He can do no less than Premier Scott if he wishes to gratify 9-tenths at least of this fair province.

Quibbling Decision

London, Ont., carried a by-law to reduce the licenses by six. The yeas were clear, the people wished it, nobody claimed they hadn't a majority. In a democratic country that vote should have been acted upon. But somebody discovered that the petition asking for the vote was short of the requirements of the law by one-tenth of a name and a judge has been found who will override the expressed wish of the people by declaring the reduction by-law null and void. Hair-splitting!

Japan and China

Ever since the occupation by Japan of Kiao-shan, the former German territory in China, negotiations have been proceeding between the Japanese and Chinese Governments. The exact nature of the demands which Japan made upon China is not known but they were undoubtedly pretty stiff. They are said to have included the transfer to Japan of German rights in the Shantung Peninsula, the granting of important commercial railroad and mining privileges, an undertaking to employ Japanese subjects as advisers in administrative, financial and military affairs, and a promise not to alienate or lease to other countries any port, harbor or island on the coast of China. China protested against the character of the Japanese demands, but it is said that these have since been modified and that there is now a better prospect of an amicable settlement. Sir Edward Grey stated in the British House of Commons that he had no doubt Japan would observe the treaty of 1905, under which Japan and Great Britain guaranteed the integrity and independence of China, together with equal commercial opportunities to all nations.—Presbyterian.

The Government and the War

It is to be noted that none of the estimated expenditures for receipts for 1915 inside war items. As a matter of fact the Government have now passed all their estimates for the fiscal year of 1915 and have not secured from the Legislature a single dollar for war purposes. Any money they have spent this year has been obtained under special warrant in view of the fact that the Dominion and Imperial Governments are

big votes from their parliaments for war, it rather confirms an idea which is becoming prevalent that the Ontario Gov't does not intend to use all the proceeds of the war tax for war purposes.

In spite of the arguments of Mr. Rowell and his colleagues, the Gov't led by Mr. Hearst, refused to pass the Leader of the Opposition's amendment to the War Tax bill which stated specifically that all the proceeds from this special tax should be applied for war purposes only. The Government did accept one or two Opposition proposals, among them, their proposal that exemption of industrial concerns from taxation should not apply in this case. There will be no exemption except statutory ones such as schools, churches and similar institutions.

Merchants who Harm Their Town

A recent address on advertising by a recognized authority in one of the Southwestern States contained a statement which is worth reproducing here, as well as elsewhere. This is the paragraph:

"There are two kinds of merchants who hold back the development of a town. One does not advertise at all, the other advertises untruthfully. The merchant who advertises untruthfully takes no more chance than he takes when he walks down to his store in the morning. Advertising is not a chance, it is an essential part of business.

Marshall Field & Co. of Chicago, does an annual business of \$10,000,000. Three per cent of this amount is spent in advertising. Some of the department stores in New York city spend 6 per cent of their total sales in advertising. The Proctor & Gamble Co. buys more than \$200,000 worth of advertising a year in the Saturday Evening Post to sell its cakes of soap. Other advertisers advertise according to similar methods, to an equal extent. This advertising is not an expense but is a means of increasing business.

Advertising with an honest line of goods and courteous treatment is the remedy for preventing the encroachment of the large chain of stores and mail order houses on the small city and town trade. Make everything about a business up-to-date, make the advertising campaigns long, earnest and honest and there is no doubt as to the success of the business."

The government is broadening the scope of the Succession Duties so as to provide more revenue. A far cry now to the time when their party raised their hands in horror at this practice "robbing the dead."

The Auditor General at Ottawa has been making things decidedly uncomfortable for certain parties in connection with war contracts. The Militia Department were in need of 30,000 field dressings and as these could only be secured in Chicago, applications was made to the Toronto agent, Mr. Shaver. Mr. Shaver wanted Mr. Garland, M. P. for Carleton to act as local agent, but he refused the law forbidding a member of Parliament to sell anything to the Government. A Mr. Powell was appointed and it turns out he is a newly appointed clerk in Mr. Garland's drug store and has been making a profit of from 40 to 60 per cent according to the Auditor General. The Militia Dept. is trying to get a refund of \$2601 from Mr. Powell! This is only one case. Many other accounts have been questioned by the vigilant watch dog.

This House is ready to provide for the exigencies of the present situation to vote all necessary ways and means to that end, but it regrets that in the measure under consideration duties are imposed which must be oppressive upon the people, whilst yielding little or no revenue, and that the said measure is particularly objectionable in the fact that, instead of favoring, it is placing extra barriers against Great Britain's trade with Canada at a moment when the mother country is under a strain of war unparalleled in history. The foregoing was the vigorous and comprehensive amendment to the budget proposal of the government, made by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The increase of the "barriers" against Britain's trade has roused resentment on both sides of politics. It was both mean and unpatriotic.
