 War Notes

— Much satisfaction is expressed that the German raider, Kron Prinz Wilhelm has sought refuge in Newport News, an American port. We think there should be anxiety as to how she managed to get in, while British warships were supposed to be watching that very harbor. In the past eight months she has sunk 15 ships, 13 of them British.

— A relief ship, flying the American flag, was sunk by a German submarine, and she carrying New York State's first cargo of girls.

— To poison wells is always reckoned pure barbarism. It is reported the Germans are doing this in South Africa. Anything goes with Prussian militarism, torpedoing ships under neutral flags carrying women and children, dropping bombs on non-combatants, etc.

— The Dominion has now 101,500 men under arms at home and abroad and this may be increased by 50,000. Sailing date of 2nd Contingent has been fixed. The delay was due to unready to receive them across the water.

— The Prince of Wales has been severely censured by a court-martial for resisting a superior officer, who was about to shoot a German spy. The Prince said he was no spy and took him off. The prince was right, it turned out and the man is now a prisoner, with we should say a warm spot in his heart to the future King of England.

BY-LAW NO. 5; A. D., 1915
 A By-law to authorize the issue and sale of Debentures to the amount of \$1400, for the purpose of erecting a schoolhouse in Section No. 3 in the Township of Bentinck.

WHEREAS the Public School Board of Section No. 3 of the Township of Bentinck in the County of Grey has applied to the Municipal Council of the said Township for the issue of debentures to the amount of \$1400 to provide for the erection of a schoolhouse in the said section.

AND WHEREAS the application for the loan for the purpose aforesaid has been submitted to and sanctioned at a special meeting of the ratepayers of the said section called for the purpose and held on the fourteenth day of November, 1914.

AND WHEREAS the said Council has determined to comply with the said application.

AND WHEREAS it is order thereto it will be necessary to issue debentures of the Corporation of the Township of Bentinck for and to create a debt to the amount of \$1400 as hereinafter provided, the same to bear interest at the rate of six per centum per annum and the proceeds of said debentures to be applied to the said purpose and to no other.

AND WHEREAS it is desirable to issue the said debentures within one year of this by-law; that the said indebtedness shall bear interest at the rate aforesaid payable yearly and shall be payable within a period of twenty years from the issue of the said debentures and that the principal and interest shall be combined and be payable in equal annual instalments during the period for which the said debentures are to run.

AND WHEREAS the total amount required by the Municipal Act to be raised annually by special rate for paying the said debt and interest is \$857.46.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rateable property of the said Township of Bentinck according to the last revised Assessment roll is \$132,250.00 and there is no existing debt of the said Township Corporation.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rateable property of the said Township of Bentinck according to the last revised assessment roll is \$117,250.00 and there is no existing debt of the said Township Corporation.

THEREFORE the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township of Bentinck enacts as follows:—

1. For the purpose of raising the said sum of Four thousand one hundred dollars, twenty debentures of the said Corporation of the Township of Bentinck shall be made for three hundred and fifty seven dollars and forty six cents each, being the total sum of combined principal and interest payable annually as aforesaid.
2. The said debentures shall be issued within two years after the passing of this by-law and shall be issued at one time and bear the same date and one of such debentures shall be paid at the end of each successive year after the issue thereof and the office of the Merchants Bank of Canada in the Town of Hanover in the County of Grey.
3. It shall be lawful for the Reeve of the said Municipality to raise, by the sale of the said debentures to any person or persons, body or bodies corporate or public willing to advance the sum upon the credit of the said debentures, a sum of money for the purpose aforesaid, not exceeding the said sum of Four thousand one hundred and fifty seven dollars and forty six cents, and cause the same to be paid to the Treasurer of the said School Board from time to time as may be required by the Board.
4. The said debentures shall be sealed with the seal of the Corporation and signed by the head of the Council or by some other person authorized by by-law to sign the same, and by the Treasurer.
5. During the currency of the said debentures or any of them there shall be raised and levied annually by special rate sufficient therefor on the whole rateable property of the Public School supporters of the said Section, the sum of \$357.46 for the purpose of paying the amount due in each year for principal and interest of the said debt when and as it becomes due.


