An Ocean Catastrophe

By German Murderers

1300 Lives Lost by sinking of the Lusitania

The great Cunard liner, Lusitania, sailed from New York with a passenger list of 1500 and a crew of 600. All went well till, when off the south coast of Ireland not far from Queenstown on Friday last, one of the German submarine horrors, sent two torpedoes into the sides of the great vessel and it went wrong. In spite of bulk heads, double bottoms and other devices the great liner began to sink and in 18 minutes she was gone. She gave a lurch forward, and this in some way prevented use of many of the boats and as a consequence the toll of death amounts to over 1300 souls. The list of saved at last accounts being 784.

The submarine, its officers no doubt chuckling over their success and looking forward to being decorated with the iron cross disappeared. What to them the 2000 lives that were being struggling for life? What to them that 150 babies under two years old met death in the waters? They were carrying out orders, they were part of the great German war machine, guided by men who have had good bye to the dictates of humanity, who have thrown away all respect for international obligations as to rules of war, and treatment of non-combatants, and so they hid homewards.

We are not surprised to read that there were rejoicings in Berlin over the sinking of the ship, not surprised to read that Berlin justifies it because it alleges, which the British government denies, it was armed.

Amongst the drowned are over 100 American citizens and the whole world has its eyes on Pres. Wilson and his cabinet, wondering if they will speak. He has been off negotiations with Huerta of Mexico because he killed or allowed to be killed, Madero. Will he still recognize a nation that wantonly destroys innocent non-combatants, amongst them women and children? The President is able, fearless in home affairs, but has to listen to the charge made by many American papers, that he is spineless at this juncture. He may know something not known to outsiders that prompts him to "choke" with the horrible doings of the Germans, but one wonders how it is possible he can keep quiet as we recall his dealings with Huerta.

Of the landing of the survivors, their tragic experiences and horrible sufferings, spare us the recording. There were many instances of bravery, of self sacrifice and devotion, much kindness by the inhabitants of Kinsale Bay, the place nearest to the catastrophe, and other places on the coast. The picture which harrows all hearts is the spectacle of these 150 babies, many with life preservers on, floating, but shook and exposure did its work. If the Kaiser has a spark of conscience left it should be fanned into flame by this slaughter of the innocents. A coroner's inquest has been held and their verdict is that the officers of the submarine, the German government and the Kaiser are guilty of murder in the first degree and there will be demands when this war is over, that the Kaiser, great as he is, should be hanged by the common hangman.

Our Ottawa Letter

A general election is to be brought on at a time when the public sense of decency resents it, by a government which has sixteen months to live if it cares to round out its full term. In a word, to avoid a lingering death, the Government is willing to risk premature burial. In the meantime, for example, that the soldiers' votes may be a painful surprise to the party in power, not to mention the outraged feelings of the people at large.

The same reasons which impelled the Government to prorogue Parliament impel it to dissolve Parliament.

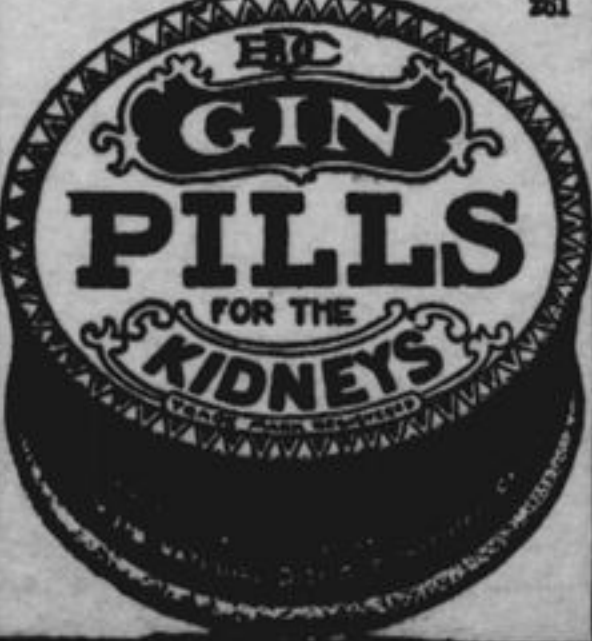

and go to the country. The chief reason is that the scandals must not have time to sink in. The calculation is that people will forget the scandals amidst the roar of the cannon and the Government will be able to sneak in under cover of the noise.

When Parliament prorogued, new vistas were opening up before the Public Accounts Committee. Mr. Carvell had his pockets full of clues volunteered by good citizens from all over Canada. There were clues enough to occupy the Public Accounts Committee all summer and then some. If the suspicions of responsible Canadians from Vancouver to Halifax were correct, everything the Government touched in the way of army supplies was a scandal. Although the committee had sat only six weeks it had bagged two members of Parliament and was looking straight at a few others. If it had gone on another week, it threatened to uncover a senatorial candidate. It was at this juncture that a dead hand reached out from the grave and rescued the Government. The minister in charge was laid down by Burinot that committees stop when Parliament stops, saved the situation. It was with a smile of relief that Dr. Reid promised that the Justice Department would take up the investigations where the Public Accounts Committee left off.

Since Parliament prorogued, the Justice Department has pecked into enough abysses to justify it in urging the Government to do it now. Everywhere it looked was a mess. Even a brave soul like Arthur Meighen viewed with alarm and shook his fist at the Yankees to draw all attention. Whether it is a matter of following up clues or punishing offenders, the Justice Department will go more comfortably about it if their friars are sustained. Scandals pop up over night, like mushrooms, which the Government has a Government that has cleansed its soul by reading two members out of the party. The Government was so anxious to have the last word on scandals that it went back ten years to find Frank Oliver but only succeeded in digging up an empty grave.

For as much as a week, Premier Borden figured as a hero. The short way he took with Gariand and Foster was the admiration of many Conservative newspapers. The story goes that it was Frank Cechrane who pushed him at it, not so much because it was the right thing to do as because it was good business. Honesty, so to speak, is the best policy when there's nothing else in sight. So with some pushing in front and more pushing from behind, Premier Borden was lifted to his niche and spoke the grand words which put the kibosh on two of his party followers. Unfortunately the Premier did not stay up there among the statues and the stained glass very long. It was W. F. Gariand that made the snatch at his halo. Him to be read out of the party by Sir Robert Borden! But it is not clear what Carleton County said about it! Carleton County at this writing is not what you might call enthusiastic about Gariand's expulsion. It looks too much like banding with bell, book and candle to suit good Orangemen and the chances are that Gariand will get the nomination again.

Carleton County is not one of those fair weather friends that stick by a man when he is right. It answers a sterner test—it sticks by a friend when he is wrong. What's a little matter like \$9,000 overcharges to break up a life-long companionship? In about so far has public opinion in Carleton County reacted that Mr. Gariand may get not only his nomination but also his money back. When Carleton County sets out to vindicate a friend's honor, it makes a thorough job of it. Meanwhile Mr. Gariand's contemptuous rebuffs from sea to sea and to the extent discomfited Premier Borden's staccato attitude. With Gariand's success in mind, it will not be like a young man of spirit, such as Arthur De Witt Foster is, to take his misfortunes lying down.

To scandals waxing and prestige waning the Honorable B. B. Rogers, as Minister of Elections, adds his own touch. He keeps pace with the best of British Columbia on the ragged edge of Quebecal pping away, Ontario grumbling, the war taxes coming home to roost, the C. P. R. not as friendly as it might be to a C. N. R. Government and other practical matters like that. Meanwhile the cost of living in Canada keeps pace with the cost of dying in Flanders and there's nothing to offset it except an unfinished report on food prices which Mr. Crothers says is the best report in the world once it gets printed. The gist of the report is that Canada is no worse off than any other country which might have to stand for a 75 per cent increase in prices at a time when people can least afford it.

All of which helps to explain why it's a hurry-up order with Bob Rogers and also why the Government is inclined to agree with him as a man who keeps his ear on the ground.
