Enthusiastic Breeder of Leicester and Cotswolds

Alex S. Muir of Artemesia, Favors the Leicester, but he thinks Nothing like Sheep on a Farm.

From Farmers' Sun of last week.

Alex S. Muir is a young man who is handling the flocks his father established twenty-four years ago. There are both pure-bred Leicesters and Cotswolds, but Mr Muir likes the former better.

Mr Muir also shows at a number of the local fairs, where he secures about all the prizes in his classes that one breeder could rightly expect to.

He suggests that some trouble with sheep comes from the fact that not sufficient care is taken of the flock. It is true that sheep do not require much care, and this fact leads owners to be careless with them—and trouble comes.

At the local markets during the past eight years wool has ranged from twenty to forty cents per pound and this year's clip averaged easily ten or eleven pounds, running in some cases as high as fourteen pounds on one animal.

In breeding he is keeping one eye on type and the other on the quality of wool. In Leicesters, too, the tendency is to breed for a finer wool.

oil has come back in the fleece, the shearing is done. The fleece is trimmed and each fleece tied up singly, the outside of the fleece being rolled in.

Matted fleece comes as a result of the sheep being allowed to run loose in the spring rains too long. Mr Muir says that shearing can not be done too soon after the water is warm enough for washing.

No Trouble with Dogs. He has never had any trouble from dogs, as others have done. His sheep are brought home to the barnyard every night, and soon learn to come of their own accord.

This spring has been a good one for sheep and Mr Muir says he has lost none of his lambs at all. From five of his ewes he got eleven lambs, which is a prolific yield.
