Doherty, pastor of Arthur for twenty-seven years, has resigned and has been permitted to retire.

ARM BROKEN.—In returning near home late Wednesday night, Mr. and Mrs. Jas Atkinson met with a severe accident. The horse shied at a pool of water, and overturning the buggy threw both out, Mrs. Atkinson getting her left arm broken between shoulder and elbow. Mr. Atkinson received a shaking up but no material injury and held on to the reins throwing the horse over, when he soon unharmed it. Little damage was done to the buggy. We trust Mrs. Atkinson will rapidly recuperate from her injury.

It is opportune time now that the hot season is setting in, to draw the attention of the citizens once more to the importance of having their premises thoroughly cleaned up—yards, cellars, wells, cisterns, etc. There are some cases of typhoid already and there may be more unless every household loyally does his part to help the Board of Health to put the town in as sanitary a condition as possible. I am having the public water supply tested and would ask the local physicians to report all such cases in writing, stating location and water supply whether from well or water-works.

WILLIAM J. MATTHEWS

Intense sympathy is felt for Mr. and Mrs Geo Matthews in the deep grief they are called upon to suffer by the death of their eldest son, Wm. J., at the age of 16 years. The cause of death was typhoid fever, complicated by pneumonia. The deceased had been a boy of great promise and had won for himself in the factory where he was employed a splendid reputation as a skilful conscientious workman and enjoyed the confidence and esteem of his fellows to a marked degree. In the home, clouded by his death his memory will always be green. His sister Blanche is employed in the telephone office and a younger brother remains to comfort the parents. Funeral to-day, Thursday to Durham Cemetery.

ROBERT HILL

On Wednesday, 2nd of June, 1915, the above gentleman passed over to the greater number at the home of his son-in-law, Mr Colin McArthur, 11th Con., Glenelg. He had reached the venerable age of 83 years, yet up to last March he was constantly employed. In that month he was at Warton on a contract and in moving to Shallow Lake on the last day of the month, he fell off a sleigh receiving some bruises and a shock to the system from which he never recovered. He was taken to O. Sound Hospital and after two weeks was removed to the home of his daughter, Mrs McArthur, where he received careful nursing. A stroke of paralysis hastened the end.

Mr Hill was borne at Ierone near Tarbet in Argyleshire, Scotland, and came to Canada with relatives at the age of 12 years. At the age of 22 he was married to Miss Mary Cairns and to them was born a family of four sons and four daughters, one daughter dying in infancy. He is survived by his aged partner and the sons are John in Ohio, Robert in Neepawa, Man., William at home, Peter in Durham. The daughters are Agnes, Mrs Alex Speers Mono Mills, Maggie, Mrs McArthur and Janet in Winnipeg.

Deceased was a mill-wright by trade and his duties took him to many parts of the country. He was an adherent of the Presbyterian Church and Rev. Mr. Whaley, Presbyterian minister of Durham, conducted appropriate services at the funeral, assisted by Rev. Mr Barclay. The funeral took place on Friday to Durham cemetery, the pall-bearers being his son-in-law, Mr Colin McArthur, Don, and Archie McArthur, grandsons, Alex Speers, son-in-law, John McOutcheon, a relative and son Peter. Mrs Speers was also at the funeral.

Mr and Mrs McArthur desire to thank friends for kindly words and deeds of sympathy during the last illness and at death of the departed, also to Mr Ellison, for the privilege of allowing the service through his firm.

## Liberal Convention

Large attendance of Delegates

H. H. Miller Unanimously Nominated for the Commons

The Town Hall was filled with delegates yesterday coming from far distant points in this big riding of South East Grey, comprising 9 townships and 7 urban centres. They came with only one man in mind, credentials were not needed. H. H. Miller was the unanimous choice amid much applause the chairman handed him the nomination. The people of South Grey have thus again before them the ablest man in political life in the county and who in a seven years trial gave such service to this riding as it never had before nor since. He is facing a large new electorate from whom in the past came an adverse majority, but conditions change, the great blunder of the 1911 election is now generally admitted and the men and the party who tried to make "well enough" better are looked upon now in a different light by the masses, especially by farmers. It is a safe guess that the cry "Let well enough alone" will not be repeated now in view of the situation the country has been brought to by the successors of the Liberal Party.

Space this week and on publishing day forbids lengthy notices of Mr. Miller's speech as well as that of H. H. Miller. The latter made an exhaustive resume of the points at issue between the parties, and sustained his great reputation in the eyes of fair-minded men, as one of the ablest statesmen in Canada to-day. Sir Wilfrid, he said, would be delighted to learn that Mr Miller would again be in the field, one of the most industrious, capable and conscientious men he ever sat with.

The speech throughout bristled with facts, interspersed with the humorous touch of which he is master but further reference is this week impossible. The report of Secy-Treas. Binnie was a unique one. He narrated the efforts he had made to have complete returns but the meagre results convinced them that the Liberal party was dead with a capital D as far as organization was concerned and appealed to all to see to it that improvement took place.

Mr Dan Knechtel after some years of efficient service as President retired and the position was given unanimously to Mr Wm. Calder, Warden of the county. Mr Binnie was re-elected Secy-Treas. The Vice Presidents are 1st John McMillan, Artemesia, and Walter Hastie, Egremont, 3rd Dr. Fortune, Ayton.

Mr Calder on taking the chair thanked the delegates for the honor and briefly outlined the political situation, and the necessity for hearty unanimous co-operation with the candidate.

Following Mr Graham's address, brief speeches were made by Mr P. McCullough, Markdale, who said our cause was much stronger than in the past and hoped for victory. Mr R. J. Davis, of Euphrasia, well known in the riding, made a clever speech. He used to be a Conservative, but had never paid membership fees to their organization, "I thought they could steal enough." He advocated organization and getting in personal touch with the electorate, which he thanked all who at last contest had stood firm and rejected that again Mr Miller was in the field. Messrs Norman and Thompson, of Osprey, spoke of conditions in the east and thought new associations would enable them to do better than ever before. Dr Fortune was sure his district would be found true. Dr. Mearns, who had nominated Mr Miller, had to go early as did several others who were called upon, well able to make good speeches.

Reference to Mr Miller's final speech must be held over. About a dozen ladies took in the main speeches and their appreciation was keen. We hope the day will come when they will get recognition in the polling booth.

DEATH OF MRS E. DAVEY.—Mr H. R. Moffat, East 4th Avenue, received a telegram on Friday morning announcing the death of his sister, Mrs Ernest Davey of Walkerville, Alta. Mrs Davey's death occurred in Edmonton Maternity Hospital. Deceased was a daughter of Mr and Mrs Thomas Moffat, of Fort McNicoll, and was in her 22nd year. She was born in Durham where she lived with her parents until she moved to Owen Sound, she being then about four years of age. Mrs Davey's maiden name was Anna Pearl Moffat and she was married to her now deceased husband only about one year ago. She was a resident of Owen Sound until three years ago when she went west to take charge of the government telephone station at Walkerville where she has resided. At Mrs Moffat, deceased was very popular with her many Owen Sound friends when she attended public school and Collegiate Institute. Beside her husband and parents, Mrs Davey is survived by one brother, Mr H. R. Moffat of this town and Mrs. Wm. Washburn of Wainwright, Alta. One sister, Mrs. B. Anderson, (Mrs) Leduc, Alta, died there a few years ago. The funeral took place at Walkerville. The sincere sympathy of the Owen Sound friends is extended to the bereaved ones.—O. B. Advertiser.

## Town Council.

Met in regular meeting on Monday night and members all present. After reading and approving of minutes Treas. Jackson reported regarding certain sales for arrears of taxes now imminent. It was moved and seconded that sales be postponed for one month.

On request of the use of the Hall was given free for the purpose of a patriotic lecture.

Mr. J. P. Telford representing the Cemetery Co. made a request for a grant of money from Council to assist them in financing. He pointed out that it was becoming increasingly difficult to make ends meet seeing that the revenue from sale of lots was decreasing as the community got supplied. Mr. J. J. Smith supported the request pointing out that they had come to a point where something had got to be done if they were not to throw it up altogether. Both pointed out that the cemetery was entirely undenominational.

Reeve Calder said his attitude now was the same as years before, one of antagonism to granting town money to the cemetery. Not much more than 50 per cent if any of the interests there come from the town. Many townspeople used other cemeteries near by and a wide area of Glenelg and Bentinck townships used the cemetery as well as the town. Mr. Lenahan took the same view but expressed his willingness to aid privately. Mr Grant thought the collapse of the company after all they had done gratuitously for the cemetery would be a serious thing and ended by moving that financial assistance be granted to the extent of \$100. This was seconded by Mr Cochrane but on the vote being taken it was lost.
