PRICEVILLE AND LIMITS

At his home in Priceville on Sunday morning, the 26th June, 1915, Alex McLean, native of Argyleshire, Scotland, after a lingering illness of some months from affection of the heart and other ailments, at the age of over the allotted time. Mr. McLean was amongst the pioneers of the township of Proton, coming there about 60 years ago with his father's family, the late Archibald McLean, where there was nothing but solid bush for miles. Through careful management the deceased and father's family accumulated plenty to keep them comfortable. A few years ago they sold the farm in Proton to Mr. L. Frook and became residents of Priceville. Then they put up a comfortable home, the two brothers and sister, Miss McLean, all unmarried. On Sandy the care fell for some years of managing the affairs, as his brother Donald was deprived of his eyesight for some years past. The deceased was possessed with

a liberal disposition, kind in his manner and fair in his dealings, a good supporter from his youth of the Presbyterian church in Priceville.

The funeral on Monday the 28th June was largely attended by all his old neighbors and those who knew him at his former home, as well as those in Priceville, showing the respect he was held in by all who remembered his acquaintance. The Rev. Mr. Matheson, his pastor, preached the funeral sermon, taking for his text the words "If a man die shall he live again" and preached an able discourse suitable for the occasion. The remains were laid to rest beside his father and mother in the small graveyard in Priceville.

He leaves to mourn his death a lonely brother deprived of eyesight and a sister, Miss M. A. McLean, who attended to her brother during his illness with tender care and now she can look back and say that she did what she could to alleviate the suffering of a dutiful brother, but the all-wise Physician saw fit to take him from the cares and sufferings of a peaceful world to enjoy the life that shall never end in the better home.

The pall bearers were six of his old friends and neighbors. Thus ends the career of another fellow mortal. The Sacrament on Sunday, the 26th June, was largely attended in the Presbyterian church in this town. The Rev. County Rate 3 1/2 Mills

Assessment of Artemesia Lowered Owing to Hydro.

One of the chief items of business at the June meeting of County Council was the appointment of Mr Fred H. Rutherford to succeed his father the late John Rutherford, as County Clerk. There were only two applicants for the position, and Mr Rutherford was the unanimous choice of the council.

Another important item of business was the equalization of the assessment. No changes were made except in the ease of Artemesia, the assessment of that township being lowered \$21,200. The village of Aytton petitioned to be a police village.

Tuesday afternoon all the members were present, except Reeve Chisholm of Holland. After the communications were read, the Warden stated he had applications for the position of County Clerk from Fred H. Rutherford, Geo Menzies and Chas H Crowe, also a letter from Mr. Menzies withdrawing his application. A by-law to appoint a clerk was introduced by Reeve Ryan of Normanby and the by-law was finally passed, F H Rutherford being appointed clerk at a salary of \$900.

It was moved by Mr Morrison, seconded by Mr Thompson that Messrs Ryan, Wilson, Brees and the mover to a committee to draft a resolution of condolence to the wife and family of the late John Rutherford and to have the same illuminated. The motion carried unanimously.

Reeve Ryan of Normanby presented a petition from the village of Aytton to the County Council to erect into a police village and leave was given Mr Ryan to introduce a by-law in accordance with the petition.

Among the communications Wednesday morning were two important memorials. One was from the city of London, asking the Ontario Gov't to amend the Colonization Act in order to assist desirable agricultural settlers to homestead farm lands in Ontario. The other was a memorial from the County of Welland to the Provincial Gov't re the reduction of license fees of motor vehicles on non residents of Ontario so as to encourage tourists to come here. There was also a letter from Mr. H. A. McGregor regarding inspection of steam boilers.

Wednesday afternoon, by-law 848, to erect the incorporated village of Aytton and parts 15 and 16 on lots of the 10th con. Township of Normanby into a police village was given its first and second readings.

It was moved by Mr. McTavish, seconded by Mr Boyd that the Council present be requested to furnish the amount of insurance carried on the property of the Corporation of the County of Grey, the name of the company carrying the insurance, the amount of each policy, the date of
