One to Her Reward

On Monday, June 7, 1915, occurred the death of Mrs Malcolm Cameron, at her home south of Antler, after a short illness. Although she had been quite ill, it was not thought that the end was so near. Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon from the Presbyterian church at Westhope, Rev. Johnston of Antler, preaching a sermon full of hope and cheer to the bereaved ones. Interment took place in the cemetery east of town.

Mary Ann Greenwood was born in Cornwall, England, March 8, 1845. At the age of two years she emigrated with her parents to Ontario, where she lived for fifty-three years. She was married to Malcolm Cameron in 1869 and this union was blessed with a family of nine children: three sons and six daughters, all of whom with the husband survive her.

The children are Archibald, May and Mrs J. W. Hunt, of Antler; John A. and William of Westhope; Mrs W. P. Campbell, Cloquet, Minn.; Mrs R. J. Corlett, Dorchester, Ont.; Mrs J. C. Hay, Rosetown, Sask.; and Mrs Andrew Hay, Crosby, N. Dak. All were present at the time of death except Mrs Corlett, who was unable to get there. Besides these she leaves to mourn three brothers, John, William and Thomas, near Durham, Ontario, and three sisters, Mrs D. J. Davis, of Lethbridge, Alta.; Mrs J. N. Dunsmore, of Hamilton, Ontario, and Mrs A. Hooper, of Priceville, Ontario.

We can only remind these mourners that she is not dead, she is only asleep—resting after a well spent life here.

To everyone she always extended a cordial greeting that lent a ray of sunshine to brighten their pathway through life. We did not fully appreciate her true worth until after the thread of life was severed. But as we caught a glimpse of the white sail that bore her away to the distant shore, we awakened to the realization that a good and righteous woman had been taken from our midst.

With her husband and family she moved to Rotineau county, North Dakota, and has made her home here up to the time of her death. She was a prominent member of the Presbyterian church for 40 years. Com.
