Avenge Belgium First

There are signs that Germany would like to make peace, following what seems like success in the East against the Russians.

Germany thinks this a favorable time. The suggestion has been met by an emphatic "No" from the allied nations, including Russia and the response from Great Britain is quite as emphatic as any.

There has been no decision yet. Each side has scored points at terrible cost. Germany has utterly failed to do what it started the war to accomplish and if a decision were arrived at as it would be in any other contest, Germany would pay the cost. It will be necessary to continue the war for some time to compel Germany to do so.

The navy of Gt. Britain has maintained its power and single handed Gt. Britain in time could wear Germany out. That would be a question of time. Belgium's cause is the world's cause and so is the cause of France. The attitude of Germany towards both nations is so inhuman that the balance of the civilized world must see that Germany falls in its purpose, and pays as far as payment is possible for its stupendous crime.

There are considerations of the greatest weight now being settled. The attitude of the Balkan States, the forcing of the Dardanelles, the recovery of Russia, the maintenance of the strength of the British and French armies in the west, the supply of munitions and other questions, must tax the stoutest hearts and intellects.

But there is the stubborn fact staring Germany in the face—that Britain will not be a party to the defeat of Belgium, because of humanity. The British flag stands for freedom. It is supported by the whole civilized world and Germany will yet know that—

The British flag where'er it flies, Where'er it may be found Beneath its folds of liberty, That spot is British ground.

The protecting flag of Gt. Britain, supported by its army and navy, will compel Germany to respect the rights of humanity to the same extent as if Belgium were in reality British ground. London Advertiser.

Troubled Mexico

United States as a Pacificer The Republic of Mexico for the past two years has been seething with discontent which at spasmodic intervals bursts into open rebellion, perhaps we should say warfare, for rebellion implies a constituted authority to rebel against and of such authority Mexico has practically none.

Self constituted "Generals" gather around them as many of the hot blooded ignorant classes as they can seduce and then "go-a-gunning" after some other aspirant for power and so there is a moral and physical welter of blood, shame and suffering. It must have proved a difficult task for a high minded nation like the States to stand by and witness the treacherous and butcheries, going on just over their borders.

Patience and "mind your own business" have ceased to be virtues and some American ships have been ordered to Vera Cruz in an endeavor in the name of humanity to stop the orgie of blood.

There are elements in the States, pro-Germans chiefly, who it is said are trying to embroil the countries into war with the hope perhaps that the flow of munitions to the Allies would be stopped. There has just been discovered evidence to prove that German officials from the Ambassador down have simply been spies using their official positions to help Germany and to create a pro German atmosphere in the States. If what is alleged is true there need be no surprise if diplomatic relations are broken off. The time and thought demanded of the President by the European conflict is sufficient, without having a Mexican war on his hands.

According to reports from all parts of the country there has been little rain in Quebec, the northern part of which would be better for more rain.

In the west the weather has been ideal and the monthly reports from various parts of the west show that the crops are coming along fine, and the various weather bureau and experimental farm directors seem to be quite optimistic as to the outcome of the crop. The cool weather and the heavy rainfall during the summer indicate that there has been a rank and rapid growth which will mean a heavy crop of straw, but the maturing of the crops has been a little late. With favorable weather, the yield will be quite heavy.
