And Now British Columbia

Special to the Durham Review.

Vancouver, Aug. 25, 1915

A significant sign of the rising tide of public opinion in British Columbia against the liquor traffic is to be found in a statement issued by John Nelson, Publisher of the Vancouver World, (Independent) in which he announces that his paper will undertake a definite campaign against the traffic. "British Columbia," the statement begins, "is soon to be asked to prohibit the liquor traffic during the war. A convention is to be held in this city in a few days and a campaign will then be outlined and plans for its prosecution made.

"The present movement springs from causes, classes and interests which in the main have not hitherto been identified with temperance reform. One has only to move about in the business community of this city and province to be convinced how comprehensive is the extent of the present sentiment. Undoubtedly the war, responsible for many disillusionments, accounts for the present conditions.

"The present campaign will be an economic one. Throughout the province it is being fathered by shopkeepers, miners, professional men, mill hands, lumbermen, farmers and business men of all kinds.

"The candid opinion of most sensible men to-day is unmistakably in one direction, namely, that no country that is at war has any business permitting the continuance of a trade which imposes unnecessary burdens on industry and commerce and entails worse ravages than war itself.

Optimism in Unity, Sask.

Splendid Crops

Mr. J. W. Crawford has given us the perusal of a letter received a few days ago from Unity, Sask. which gives a whiff of western optimism over abounding crops. The writer is a hardware merchant and in close touch with the farming community. He says: "Mr Simmonds was in to-day, 13th inst, for his twine and starts cutting on your farm next week and cutting around Unity will be fairly general then. I have never seen a better crop in this or any other country. I was out over your farm ten days ago and it certainly looks fine. The oats near the buildings are ready for the cutting and wheat will be ready by the 18th. Wesley Sirrs (formerly of Egremont—Ed.) started cutting barley yesterday and he will be kept busy right along. Mike has a grand crop, told me when in for twine he expected to have eight cars of wheat to ship. He has put up 100 tons of hay besides breaking up the quarter of new land. . . .

I wish you could see your way clear to start putting up that block again. Last week we had a man here that wanted to start a gents' furnishing store, and could not get a place so had to go away. Also the Gov't would have rented a part of the building for the new phone offices and the only place they could get was the back of Tailors' shop in Walters building. We have the phone system about completed, there is I believe about 180 miles of wire in the country, going north, east, south and west and 44 phones in town, so you will understand that it is some system and requires some room for the offices. But they could only get the place mentioned and they are not suited with it very well.

I suppose you are quite well suited over the Manitoba elections. The Tories surely got a good drubbing and Sir Jas Aikins did not escape. I suppose the crooked work done in connection with the new Parliament Bld'gs could not be more corrupt in any country and the Roblin gov't will go down in history as the most corrupt gov't in the history of Canada. Alberta certainly made a clean sweep in their votes for Prohibition and I understand that your leader is going to put up a great fight again in old Ontario for total prohibition. He made several speeches while out in this country and I think was well received every time. The closing of the bar has been a good thing for Unity, we never see a drunk man now, and on fair day when so many people were here not one was drunk and I think the same applies to all the province.

He goes on to tell of a great horse barn going up, the best in the country. Another neighbor of Mr. Crawford's is building what Mr. Tucker, his cor., considers will be the best farm house in the Province, the hot water and plumbing arrangements alone costing over \$1000. He is very anxious to have Mr. Crawford back. Robt. Vollett, John and Wm Sirrs, all South Grey boys, are near by and doing well.

Mr. Crawford intends going west about threshing time to look after his important interests there.

Compliments were showered on the Williamsford choir for their tasteful selections and in rendering. The string strains of the bagpipes in the hands of young McCormack were thoroughly enjoyed. Solos were given by Mr Allan Bell, Miss Katie McFayden and by some members of the choir. All this with Mr. R. Ledingham's gramophone selections gave a musical character to the evening. Mr. C. Ramage was called on for an address but gave up his time to H. H. Miller of Haver who had to leave early. Mr. Miller has few equals in making a stirring patriotic appeal and his outline of the war and the necessity of Canadians awakening to their responsibility in the matter was powerfully set forth. Mr. Breeze, Chairman, was the next speaker and at some length along the same lines gave fluent expressions to many fine sentiments.
