BY-LAW NUMBER 304 of the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Egremont.

A By-law to take the vote of the ratepayers of the Police Village of Holstein in the Township of Egremont entitled to vote on money By-laws on a question to be submitted whether the said ratepayers are in favor of a supply of electric power from the Hydro Electric Power Commission of Ontario.

WHEREAS the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township of Egremont deems it advisable to submit to the ratepayers of the said Police Village of Holstein in the Township of Egremont entitled to vote on money By-laws a question as to whether the said ratepayers are in favor of a supply of electric power from the Hydro Electric Power Commission of Ontario.

THEREFORE the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Egremont enacts as follows:

1. That the following question be submitted to the ratepayers of the Police Village of Holstein in the Township of Egremont entitled to vote on money By-laws:

Are you in favor of obtaining from the Hydro Electric Power Commission of Ontario a supply of electric power?

2. That the votes of the said ratepayers shall be taken on this question at the following time and place by the Deputy Returning Officer and Poll Clerk hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:

On Friday, the 27th day of August, A. D., 1915, commencing at the hour of nine o'clock in the forenoon and continuing till five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.

At John D. Roberts' Hall in the Village of Holstein by DAVID ALLAN, Deputy Returning Officer and J. R. HUNT, Poll Clerk.

3. A true copy of this By-law shall be published in the following newspaper on the days hereinafter mentioned, that is to say: In "THE DURHAM REVIEW" on the 19th, 19th and 20th days of August, 1915, respectively, and a copy of this By-law shall be posted at the polling place mentioned above at the time specified in the said By-law.

4. On Thursday, the 26th day of August, A. D., 1915, at the Clerk's Office in the said Township of Egremont at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, the Reeve of the said Township will in writing, signed by him, appoint two persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk of this Corporation and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of the answering of the said question in the affirmative and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of the answering of the said question in the negative respectively.

5. The 28th day of August, A. D., 1915, at the Council Chamber in the Township of Egremont at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, is hereby appointed for the summing up by the Clerk of the said Corporation and the persons appointed in writing, signed by him, in the affirmative and in the negative respectively.

BY-LAW NUMBER 305 of the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Egremont.

A By-law to authorize the borrowing of a sum of \$3,000 by the issue and sale of debentures to provide for the cost of a plant to distribute electric power to be supplied by the Hydro Electric Power Commission of Ontario to the Police Village of Holstein in the Township of Egremont.

WHEREAS it is deemed advisable and necessary to raise a sum of \$3,000 on the credit of the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Egremont for the purpose of providing for the cost of a plant to distribute electric power to the Police Village of Holstein in the Township of Egremont, to be supplied by the Hydro Electric Power Commission of Ontario.

AND WHEREAS in order thereto it will be necessary to issue debentures of the said Township of Egremont for the sum of \$3,000 hereinafter provided (which is the debt intended to be created by this By-law, the proceeds of the said debentures to be applied to the purpose aforesaid and no other).

AND WHEREAS it is desirable to issue the said debentures at one time and to make the principal of the said debt repayable by yearly instalments during the period of twenty years being the period of such respective annual sums being of such respective amounts that the aggregate amount payable in each year for principal and interest in respect of the said debt shall as nearly as possible equal the amount so payable in each of the other nineteen years of said period (as shown in Schedule "A" hereto annexed).

AND WHEREAS the total amount required by "The Municipal Act" to be raised annually by special rate on the property of the Township of Egremont, in respect of the said debt, as hereinafter provided is the sum of \$251.04.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rateable property of the said Township of Egremont according to the last revised assessment roll thereof is the sum of \$1,930,712.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the existing debentures of the said Township of Egremont, of which the said debt is a part, is \$200,000.

THEREFORE the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Egremont enacts as follows:

Ratepayers of Holstein have an important choice to make to-morrow. By-law 304 asks for acceptance of Electric service from the Commission, By-law 305 asks sanction to spend \$3000 in 20 years to secure it. The citizens have no doubt considered the question in all its bearings and will be able to vote intelligently.

If rejected Friday it will almost certainly be undertaken some time in the future, but at more inconvenience and expense than at present. The details of the service are somewhat obscure at this stage, at least to novices, but the best argument in its favor is that not one place that has adapted it has been sorry for doing so. We are told that expense at first may be a little heavier but that it goes less when finally adjusted. The service is bound to be up-to-date and all communities claiming to be progressive have adopted it.
