#### Mr. Rowell's War Speeches

Sept. 6—Labor Day. With Sir J. Hendrie, Lieut. Gov. of Ontario, at Sturgeon Falls. Subject "Working Men and the War."

Sept. 7. At Renfrew, Ont. with Sir Geo. Foster.

Sept. 9. At Toronto with Sir Geo. Foster at annual meeting of Life Underwriters' Association of Canada.

Speaking at this meeting, Sir Geo. said—"I confess to you that every time I see the open bar and see the young soldiers of this country coming in and going out, every time I pass the open bar and see the unemployed who perchance have got a day's employment, making a bare-lime, I confess that my soul cries out for the closed bar in Canada."

Mr. Rowell said—"If we have in our midst to-day an institution which is demanding sums of money for its perpetuation and is giving no return in value but is impairing the earning capacity of the men who patronize it, there is only one patriotic duty for every patriotic citizen; that to the extent of his ability this curse will be wiped out—the curse of the open bar. Let us have the courage in this supreme crisis to rise to the height necessary in order that this thing should be done and done promptly."

The largest, most representative and most enthusiastic convention ever held in British Columbia just recently closed its sessions. The convention passed a resolution asking that the Government should submit to people the question of the abolition of the liquor traffic in B. C. by a bill similar to that carried in Alberta in July.

Up to the present time B. Columbia has not even had a local option law but now it looks as if the public are going to have a voice as to whether or not the whole liquor trade in the Province is to be wiped out.

#### That Canning Combine

Buying Water for Tomatoes

Last week the Sun referred to a big canning combine which had been formed with the view to controlling all of Canada's canning companies. The Monetary Times outlined the situation as having in the past been one where disputes arose as to what were fair prices to be paid by the canning companies. Then, too, canned goods sold at too low prices to suit canners.

This frank statement of the case was dealt with by Grain Growers' Guide as follows: "In other words the new arrangement will enable the canners to reduce the prices which they pay to farmers for fruit, tomatoes, corn, peas &c., and increase the prices which they charge to the wholesalers and through them to the retailer and consumer for their products. It is the Protective Tariff that makes combines of this kind possible. Under Free Trade the Canadian canners would be compelled by competition with British and United States concerns to manufacture and sell a good article at a fair price in order to retain their customers. That the Canadian product is not of the best quality was proved not long ago by the report of the Chief Analyst of the Dominion Government that one-third of the contents of cans of tomatoes examined by him was water, and that three cans out of five contained less than a reasonable standard of fruit, such as was required by the State of Ohio, for example. Nevertheless canned tomatoes and other vegetables, including corn and baked beans, are 'protected' by a duty of 1 1/2 cents per pound, the weight of the can being included in the weight for duty with an additional 7 1/2 per cent ad valorem under the war budget. This, truly, is 'protection' which sacrifices the people at large to the greed and cunning of a few exploiters.

#### Frauds in Munition Supplies

A London despatch to the New York Sun says there have been gross frauds or extreme carelessness, on the part of some American manufacturers engaged in the supply of munitions for the Allies. In one case it is said that one bulk order of 800,000 shells supplied by an American manufacturer was passed by the British inspectors in the United States whose duty it is to examine the goods before their shipment, and reached the trenches before it was discovered that not one of the shells fitted the guns. Another shipment of machine gun ammunition was found to be ten per cent defective. The tragedy for which this might be responsible can easily be conceived when considering that every tenth shot would clog the gun and compel the men in attendance to remain unprotected in face of the enemy's fire while removing the defective cartridge.
