Grey County Breeders' Club to hold Another Sale

On the 17th of March, 1915, there was held in the village of Markdale a sale of pure bred beef breeds of cattle. These animals were contributed to the sale by the breeders of the County of Grey.

The breeders had their annual meeting on July 3rd last and decided to have their annual sale for 1916 on the 3rd of March.

All entries for the sale must be in the hands of the Secretary, Thos. H. Binnie, Priceville R. R. No 2, not later than Jan. 1, 1916, so that the animals be inspected and the proper animals asked to remain away from the sale and advice given to the breeder as to how best prepare and ship the animals to the sale in Markdale.

With the entries must be sent a money order for \$5 per head to cover the expenses of the sale, advertising, auctioneer, etc. If the animals entered fail to pass inspection the fee will be returned.

This is done so that the officers will not have the same trouble collecting the expenses of the sale as they have had this year.

We have the good cattle in Grey County if we will only fit them up for sale. Let us all get busy and see if we cannot make the 1916 sale one which will be hard to beat in the years to come.

PROTON COUNCIL

Proton Council met at Hopeville on Aug. 21st with all members present, and Reeve, Jos. Goodfellow presiding

A deputation from Mr. Forest appeared before the Council on behalf of the good roads scheme being taken up by Wellington county of building a gravel or macadam road between the townships of Proton and West Leith, Arthur and Egremont.

A motion that the Council approve of the scheme being taken up by the Township was voted down.

Many small accounts, principally for gravelling and road improvement were passed.

The Treasurer was authorized to accept from Arch. Ferguson \$4 being error in taxes.

Jas Scott was paid \$2.25 for use of house for Council meeting.

A rate of 12 mills on the dollar was struck to pay County, Township and General School rates. Council adjourned to meet at Hopeville on Sept. 25.
