The Lower House of the Anglican Synod had a hot time over the question of the third verse of the National Anthem which asks "O Lord our God arise Scatter our enemies And make them fall. Confound their politics Frustrate their knavish tricks Oe thee our hopes we fix God says us all.

This had been left out the bygone years ago, and by a vote of 89 to 72 it was decided not to reinstate it, the main reason being that it was unchristian and unnecessary as an expression of patriotism.

Keir Hardie

This prominent British public man passed away in Glasgow last week and the ranks of labor sustain a very great loss. As boy and young man from 7 to 24 he knew effectively what labor meant in the mines. He was wholly self educated and became a man of remarkable culture, widely read, a fine speaker and had a ready pen. All his soul and all his attainments were given to the cause of labor, to advocacy of peace, to women's suffrage and to other humanitarian causes. His ability was early recognized by his fellow miners, became President of their union, ran for Parliament which he entered in 1880. He had abandoned moral courage and though "more frisks than roses were thrown at him" he held on his way, often in isolation but always respected.

The Provincial elections in Prince Edward Island resulted in reducing a Conservative majority of 28 to 4. Only recently automobiles have been allowed to run in this island and run or not run was an issue in many constituencies.

Steffanson, the explorer, sent to the Arctic by the Dominion government in 1913, and long supposed to be lost, has got in touch with civilization once more and reported to the government that he is still "on the job" so to speak. He has an interesting story of new lands discovered, north of Alaska not without much privation. He is preparing to pursue the work for another winter.

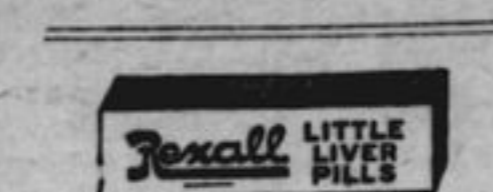
