Early Closing Wanted

TORONTO, 11th October, 1915
Special to the Review.

Whatever the final decision of the government on the seven o'clock closing proposal may be there are a few facts of outstanding interest in connection with the controversy.
1. On April 1, 1915, during the session of the Ontario Legislature, the government voted down the proposals made by the Opposition that all drinking places should be closed at seven o'clock, eight o'clock, nine o'clock and ten o'clock and on Saturday at nine o'clock. The government did close the shops at seven o'clock but left the bars and clubs open.

2. There has been no denial that the Central License Commission after consultation with military authorities, recommended to the government the proposal of closing all drinking places at seven o'clock.
3. McGarry and Ferguson who have always been distinguished by the better class among both Liberals and Conservatives and who have been in the political limelight untiringly a number of times, are the leaders in the Cabinet against the early closing proposal.

4. All the talk at the time of the appointment of the commission about the liquor traffic now having been taken out of politics has been proved in the last two weeks to be absolutely untrue.

The license board made a recommendation to the government and if there was no political influence the government would have accepted that recommendation right away. Instead of that they have delayed and delayed and by their very delay encouraged such a political lobby by the liquor interests against the temperance measure as has not been seen at the Parliament buildings since the same liquor interests prevented the government from taking any real temperance action at the last session.

Progressive Politics

Equal Suffrage

At the beginning of the war some people thought women's suffrage would be one of the issues which would drop out of sight for some time. As a matter of fact, however, the movement is gaining ground rapidly.

The governments of Alberta and Manitoba will at their next sessions introduce equal suffrage bills and Saskatchewan gives prospects of similar action. On Monday last the women of Norway voted for the first time.

When the women of the three prairie provinces have full provincial rights of voting and when, as is likely, this will extend to votes in federal elections, a great impetus will be given to the movement for women's suffrage in the provinces where success at present does not seem near.

Temperance

March, 1916, is the date chosen in Manitoba for a referendum on Prohibition. If it carries Premier Morris announces no licenses will be issued next May.

In British Columbia a "People's Prohibition" movement is meeting with much success. The Orange Or-

Owen Sound Presbytery

A well attended meeting was held at Owen Sound Oct. 5th, at which an excellent report of the work of Mr Miers in the Lion's Head, Lindsay and Spry field was received and adopted.

Two resignations of pastors were tabled, one to be dealt with on Oct. 19th, the other at the December meeting. Names are withheld till resignation is disposed of. The amount expected from the Presbytery for the general work of the church this year, including Missions, is \$18,500. The allocations to congregations is the same as last year and all ministers are urged to do their utmost to secure the amount. Exchange of pulpits for this object where thought desirable, are to be arranged personally.

The question of Church Union is to be voted on again on the second and third Sabbaths of November, as far as possible, literature sent out by Assembly to be distributed as soon as convenient, ballots on the first Sabbath of November. Other literature bearing the names of responsible persons, on either side of the question, is recommended for distribution and the whole membership of the church enjoined to give the matter most prayerful and thoughtful consideration and to vote yes or nay. The question will be determined by the votes of those voting. Those not voting are assumed to agree with the decision of the majority of those voting. It is hoped that this vote may be a decision one way or other.
