Shooting of One Woman Shocks the World

Germany in the war has slain her thousands and hundreds of thousands of her enemies, as well as murdered hundreds of thousands of her own soldiery by the usual frontal attacks. She has got odium in great measure for her wanton submarine attacks on passenger vessels and for Zeppelin attacks on undefended cities and innocent non-combatants, but a greater depth of infamy is laid to her charge by the deliberate murder of one noble woman.

Miss Edith Cavell, a name that will ever stand high in Britain's honor roll, was an English nurse in Brussels. Devoted to her profession, she had nursed German wounded as well as those of the Allies, but she had aided in some way a few British and Belgian prisoners to escape death, by getting out of the country. She was found out, did not deny it, and was imprisoned and suffered much in spite of the intervention of the American Ambassador (acting at request of the British government) in her behalf.

It came to be known that she was to be shot and the Ambassador used every means to save her, but was desperately put off and put off till the truth came out that she was shot by soldiers acting under authority at 2 a. m.

She died a heroine, pinned a small union Jack on her breast and said she was glad to die for her country.

And Edith Cavell has not died in vain. Every drop of her martyr blood calls on her countrymen to avenge her death. In all parts of the empire the story is bearing fruit in increased recruiting and increased determination to humble the Huns for this brutal deed.

The press of all neutral countries and even some German papers condemn the cold-blooded morning murder.

Unnecessary Waste

On Monday next, throughout the Province of Ontario, no liquor may be sold in any licensed tavern after 8 p. m. by order of the Provincial License Commissioner. The reason given is that owing to the war "all unnecessary expenditures" should be curtailed. Premier Hearnst in endorsing the finding says we "must conserve all our energies and resources."

What a telling indictment! If drinking liquor as a beverage in war time is an unnecessary expenditure and a waste of energies and resources, how can it be otherwise in times of peace?

Addressing of Mail

In order to facilitate the handling of mail at the front and to ensure prompt delivery it is requested that all mail be addressed as follows:

- (a) Regimental Number
 - (b) Rank
 - (c) Name
 - (d) Squadron, Battery or Company
 - (e) Battalion Regiment (or other unit) Staff appointment or Department
 - (f) CANADIAN CONTINGENT
 - (g) British Expeditionary Force
 - (h) Army Post Office, LONDON, Eng.
- Unnecessary mention of higher formations, such as brigades, divisions, is strictly forbidden and causes delay.

Says an exchange:—Soldiering is a cure for sore eyes.
