Dry Forces in Big Drive

More than one-seventh of all municipalities in Ontario that remain under license are being attacked by the temperance forces, voting to take place at the next municipal elections.

The present situation in the province is that of the municipalities, 566 are already dry. At the 291 remaining under license, 41 voted upon Local Option by laws in January, next.

During the past five years 151 municipalities have gone dry and during the same five years only one municipality has gone back to license.

The General Secretary of the Alliance likens the campaign in Ontario to that of the allies in France and Flanders.

"We make a drive and dig in," said he, "and we always hold the ground we gain." To-day the temperance forces are in better position than ever for the coming fight, and unless all signs fail, will win another big victory.

The places voting include 8 cities, 11 towns, 10 villages and 15 rural municipalities.
