Church Union

The question of Church Union is at present a live question among Presbyterians, the vote of the congregations having to be taken this month as to whether they favor union with the Methodist and Congregational bodies on the "Basis of Union," prepared after much care and prayerful thought by committees of the three bodies. The last meeting of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church by a large majority favored the Basis, preponderating majorities in the other churches also favor it, and should it be consummated in a truly Christian spirit, it would be a decidedly uplifting force in the national life.

In the memory of many still living three or four Methodist bodies merged into one and it can yet easily be remembered by those in middle life when Auld Kirk, Free and United Presbyterian Churches went their separate ways, with as much of antagonism to each other as now exists between the three modern bodies. Who would be bold enough to say that the unions of the past were not good? And if this further step were taken we believe that before many years went by, the bitterest opponent would say "I was mistaken."

In the proposed Union there had to be of course give and take, but it is wrong to say, as is being said now for a purpose, that every distinctive feature of Presbyterianism is being abandoned. Every individual congregation will be allowed to retain its organization if it so wished. The "call" to ministers would still be retained, the pastorals may go on indefinitely. There will be no lowering of the standards of the ministry and there would be no long gaps of empty churches while the congregation was measuring up, sometimes with bitterness, the merits of the probationers sent to supply.

The great work done by Presbyterianism can not be lost, the work it and other bodies are doing will be enhanced by the removal of overlapping and by the quenching of differences that hinder united action. Once a year we have union prayer meetings for a week, sometimes two, and if united supplications to the Throne of Grace are considered important for a limited time, we fail to see why all the time would not be better.

A vote against union would make certain hymn sentiments ridiculous. "We are not divided, all one body, we," "Like a mighty army moves the Church of God."

"Service"

"Service" has been adopted as the motto of the Liberal Club Federation of Ontario and many compliments have been given the organization for its choice of a slogan. The Toronto Star for example in an editorial on the question says:

"As an optimistic sign of the times the motto of the Liberal Club Federation of Ontario, "Service" is significant. It means a real development in political ideals and in a definite vivid way summarizes graphically what may be called the "renaissance of idealism" in politics. The Federation has a splendid record of actual enlistments for the front from its officers and members. Those who for various reasons cannot serve with the colors at present are evidently determined that through their organization they will do their share in various kinds of patriotic endeavors and activities."

The Federation at present is holding a series of conferences to discuss further means of assisting in enterprises connected with the war. With in the last week conferences have been held in Hamilton and London for Central and Western Ontario respectively and similar conferences are planned for Belleville and the County of Dundas.

Let's Have a Referendum

The new regulation imposed on License holders by the Board of License Commissioners compelling them to close bars at 8 p. m. is having a good effect it is reported, and that it is not to be played with, has been proved by several fines for violation of the new ordinance.

The restriction is not too severe by any means and does not meet the desire of the average Ontario conscience, which would relegate the whole business to oblivion. In Newfoundland for some time the hour of opening has been 9 a. m. and must close promptly at 6 p. m. There is a measure before the local parliament there to provide for the taking of a referendum on Prohibition at an early date.

Such a vote, free from party politics, is greatly desired in Ontario. The committee of One Hundred, recently appointed in Toronto, and totally free from party prejudice, has such a vote in view as one of the chief objectives of their activity. The Ontario government will hardly dare to resist the pressure this committee and the regular forces of the Ontario Alliance will be able to bring upon them to provide for a referendum, asking at least, the complete suppression of the liquor traffic in this province during the war.

The slogan of the temperance forces is "a dry Ontario by 1st July, 1916."
