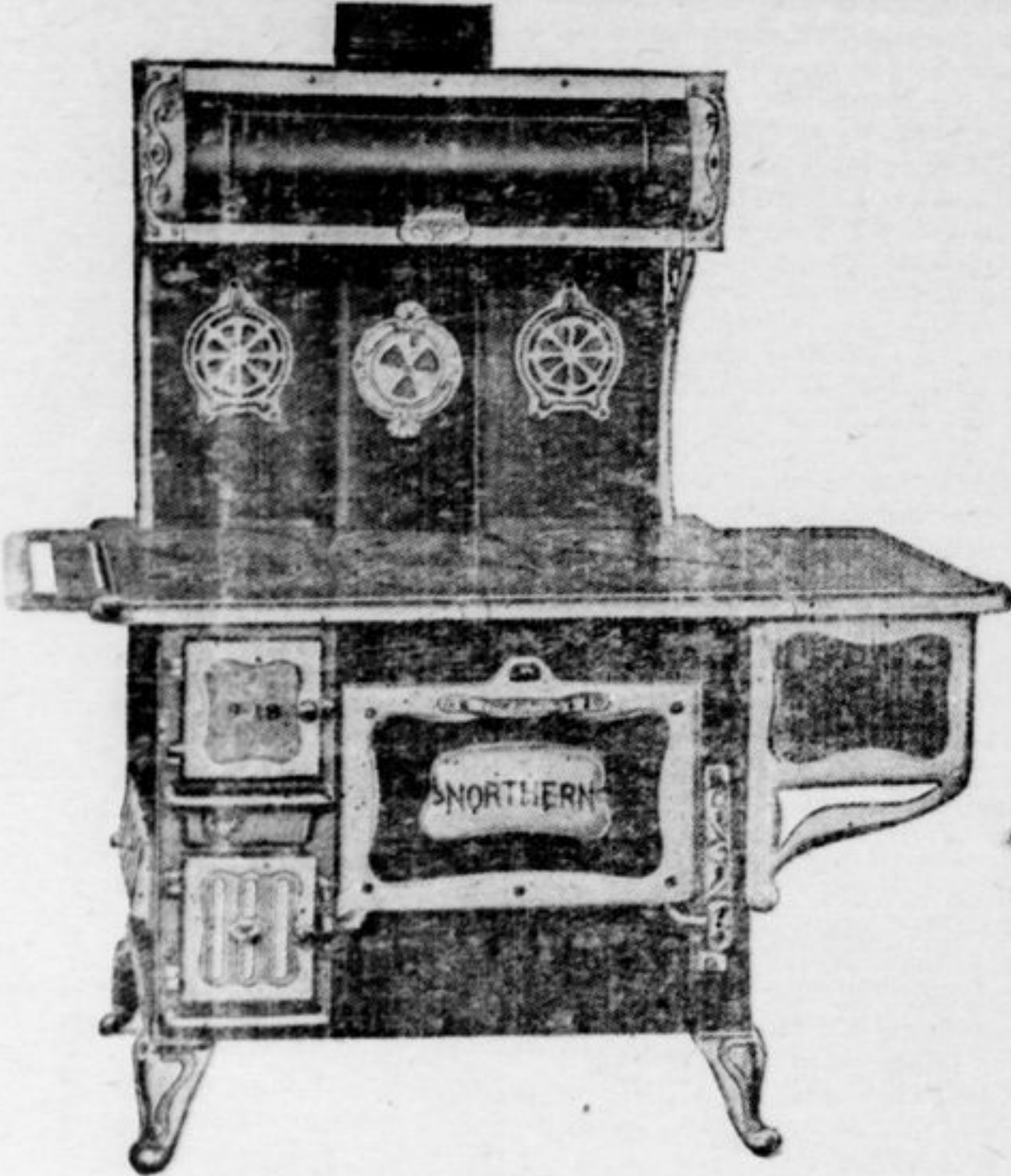

### Conditions Bad at Dardanelles

The following clipping has been sent us by Dr. Coutts in a brother-in-law of Rev. Dr. Farquharson and the conditions he depicts are not calculated to arouse optimism:

"A letter was received from Dr. Coutts this week bearing date of Oct. 5th. He had been in hospital for a week or so and felt taking on his duties again, but he adds: 'The medical officer in charge refuses to give the word.' The general health conditions on the island are not so good as we could wish. He says: 'Four of our doctors are leaving invalided for England. There seems to be an evil spell over the place. Men simply can't keep fit. Another of the sisters in one of the Canadian hospitals across the harbor died of dysentery a fortnight ago--a Mrs. Jagard, the matron, a cousin of Sir R. L. Borden.' He speaks of the unceasing of the Balkan situation and their eagerness for news, but, they, like ourselves, are in the dark as to the significance of the changing movements.

Lance Corporal J. M. Farquharson had a short furlough in the beginning of November and was able to visit some of his friends in England."
