The old Kirk hated to give up the name of St. Andrew's church and the Free did the same in giving up St. Paul's. Some of the old heads by their expressions meant "I'll forget these 120 years, but my right hand forget its cunning, can I forget Thee, dear old St. Andrew's church, and join in with St. Paul's? No, never." But the rivers of time changed and union was taken and a new minister taken in charge and the result was harmony. Some nearly 40 years ago till now. So it would be with these bodies if united, in course of time all would work in harmony for the advancement of the Kingdom for which all are responsible stewards whether Presbyterians, Methodists or Congregationalists. Applications, accompanied by a deposit of ten per cent of the amount subscribed, must be forwarded through the medium of a chartered bank. The bank will issue a provisional receipt.
